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Message from the MGA President

After two years of change and innovation, the 1987 golf season will be characterized by the expansion and improvement of existing services and events.

The major change is the appointment of Jeff Hnaliuk as executive director. Jeff's academic background and personality are well suited to serving the needs of the members. New job descriptions for the executive director and technical director have been implemented to identify and consolidate responsibility for the various activities of the association and to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of our program delivery.

The introduction of golf to the Manitoba Summer Games program in 1988 will provide a unique opportunity for a committee of members of both the MGA and MLGA to work together in conducting the competition. Regional play-downs involving men and women from junior to senior age brackets will be conducted in 1987 in preparation for the official competition in 1988.

A Rural Junior Championship will also be conducted in 1987. Eligibility for this event will be consistent with the rules for the Rural Amateur and Seniors.

In an effort to eliminate the backlog of courses to (re)rated and (re)measured, an expanded committee has been established. Greater attention will be paid to determining the number of courses that can realistically be rated over the season and improving the communication concerning rating and measuring with member clubs. A Greens Committee was also established to assist member clubs in obtaining expertise in course management. The technical director's duties have been expanded to include co-ordination of both these activities.

Early this year many city courses were faced with potential property tax

increases of up to 169 percent. The MGA submitted a brief to the Minister of Urban Affairs urging him to create a separate tax classification for recreational facilities. I am pleased to report our efforts were successful and the MGA is indebted to His Worship Mayor Norrie, other members of City Council and the Manitoba Sports Federation for their active support of our position.

The success of the 1986 Manitoba Open has paved the way for a bigger and better event in 1987. Canadian Airlines International, Keystone Ford and I.C.G. Liquid Gas Co. will be joined this year by The Bay, Blackwoods Beverages and Labatt's will continue their support and together with the par-

ticipation of 20 gold patrons, the silver and bronze patrons, the tournament's financial viability is assured. The Southwood Golf and Country Club Committee must be commended for their efforts in achieving this goal. In 1987, the Open will have a prize purse of \$75,000, the fourth largest on the Canadian tour including the Canadian Open. The competition will be expanded to 72 holes to enable it to be included in the Sony world rankings and encourage an even stronger field of entrants.

On the Amateur scene, our best players will try to improve on Manitoba's runner-up finish in the Willingdon Cup in Edmonton in August. The graduation from the junior ranks of two-time Canadian champion Todd Fanning leaves the junior competition wide open. The emergence of a number of very young players indicates a promising future for Manitoba in national competitions. Gord Lenton, runner-up in last year's Canadian Seniors will attempt to win in his second Manitoba Championship at his home course, Pine Ridge, and inspire an improved performance in the Inter-provincial Team Matches.

This eighth successful edition of the Golf Annual is our leading opportunity for direct contact with the more than 10,000 members of the MGA. I trust you will enjoy the contents of your annual. We would also welcome enquiries from members and clubs concerning our services and ways we can be of assistance. This participation by the membership will enable us to better serve your needs.

Best wishes for an enjoyable golf season.

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In Memoriam

Two past presidents of the Manitoba Golf Association died early this year. They are remembered here for their years of service to the sport in Manitoba.

HUGH ELLIOTT CALDWELL

A longtime member and past president of Elmhurst Golf and Country Club, Hugh Caldwell died in Winnipeg March 30. He was in his 76th year.

He served as president of the Manitoba Golf Association in 1972.

Born at Virden, Man., he received his education in Winnipeg with the exception of four years in Maryland. He was employed by Eaton's of Canada for many years.

An ardent sportsman, he participated in baseball, hockey, paddling, track, curling and golf.

In addition to his executive work at Elmhurst and in the MGA, he was a past president of the Eaton Curling Club and was active with the Granite Senators Curling Club and the Sir John Franklin Curling Club as well as the Past Presidents Curling Association.

He was survived by his wife Ann and two daughters, Audrey Joan Stewart of Sudbury and Barbara Ann Wiley of Saskatoon. There are five grandchildren.

HENRY BRUCE BOREHAM

A link with Winnipeg's sporting past was severed Jan. 23 with the death of Bruce Boreham in Victoria. He was 95.

A former sportswriter and administrator, he was a member of the Tuxedo Golf Club and served as president of the Manitoba Golf Association in 1944-45. He had been the oldest surviving past president of the association.

Born June 7, 1891, at Fort William, Ont., he moved to Winnipeg and worked as a sportswriter for the Winnipeg Telegram and Winnipeg Tribune, where he became sports editor.

In 1926 he was involved with the creation of the Macdonald Brier national curling championship and was a director of the Brier from 1940 to 1979.

He joined Canadian National Railways in 1929 as public relations director and held that post until his retirement in 1956. After working on public relations at Assiniboia Downs for a few years, he moved to Victoria in 1960.

He was survived by his second wife Clare. They had no children. He had one son and one daughter from his first marriage, his first wife having predeceased him a number of years ago. □

Jeff Hnatiuk named MGA Executive Director

The emphasis was on youth as the Manitoba Golf Association selected a new executive director in the spring.

Jeff Hnatiuk, a 26-year-old Selkirk native with a bachelor of recreation degree, assumed his duties in March.

He succeeds Ken Hanford, who announced his retirement earlier this year after three years in the position.

MGA President Jim Bristow said the association received 37 applications for the position, about one-third each from the under-30, 30-50 and 50-and-over age categories.

"We decided on a young person who is interested in a career in sport administration, rather than an older candidate looking for a career change or a retired man seeking a second career," Bristow explained. "I think we've found a young man with the credentials to do a good job for the association."

Hnatiuk, an older brother of reigning Manitoba Amateur golf champion Glen, was quick to admit he didn't possess the golfing skills of his brother, but said he could "shoot in the mid-80s" around the Selkirk course and would probably play to a handicap of 15.

He also worked around golf courses in the past, spending four summers at Selkirk and one at Pine Ridge on course maintenance.

Hnatiuk is a graduate of the University of Manitoba, where he obtained his bachelor of recreation degree. Earlier,

he received his bachelor of arts degree in recreation studies at the University of Winnipeg.

Between those degrees, he spent two years at Melita, Man., as recreation director for the Antler River recreation district and worked with the provincial sports directorate for five months while completing his university studies.

"Sports administration has always been an interest for me," Hnatiuk said when he was asked why he had applied for the position. "Golf is also one of my main sports interests, so this was an opportunity to get into administration in a sport I know and like."

He expected his role with the MGA would include handling public relations for the association, assisting the volunteer board to achieve its goals and keeping the members aware of resources available to assist in programs.

He was becoming well entrenched in his new duties by the time the 1987 golf season opened in April and going through a busy time preparing for the schedule of tournaments and other activities.

"It has been a little hectic finding my way around with the quick start, but I'm certainly enjoying it and looking forward to the season," he said in a recent interview. "I will be better organized at this time next spring, once we have a year to get a line on what's needed." □

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MGA Technical Director has a busy first year

Todd Teplitzki spent a busy year since his appointment in February, 1986, as the Manitoba Golf Association's first technical director.

He is well on the way to an even busier second year, with some additional duties added to his position.

Teplitzki began the 1986 summer with the primary objective of promoting and developing golf and junior golfers in the rural areas of the province.

Clinics were co-ordinated in 23 locations, Teplitzki covered 7,200 miles, and more than 400 juniors and 200 adults were exposed to the basic fundamentals of golf.

While the main focus was on junior development, it was apparent there was also a demand for adult instruction.

Twice in July, the technical director's services were requested to expose children to the sport as part of the Sports Caravan operated by the City of Winnipeg.

The MGA also took a small step toward enhancing the knowledge of the game of golf with future physical educators as Teplitzki, a graduate in recreational studies himself, assisted in setting up a course at the University of Manitoba.

Since the involvement with the faculty of physical education, Teplitzki was also contacted by the Bison Sports Camps at the U of M and asked to assist in planning a two-week golf program for the summer camps, which cover several activities. Directed toward children between the ages of 10 and 15, it will run from July 29 to Aug. 22.

He is also involved in a survey to see to what extent golf is offered in the physical education curriculum in junior and senior high schools. He put on a short golf presentation for the Physical Education Teachers Association of Manitoba last October and made many school contacts.

A number of clinics will be held throughout the province again this summer, with members of the Manitoba division of the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association involved to provide instruction.

As part of new responsibilities taken on by the technical director this year, Teplitzki is assisting in organizing the MGA committee for course rating. The committee includes Bud Foster, D.I. MacDonald, Bill Pidlaski, Rick Thain (chairman), Gord Lenton, Steve Banatyne and Ted Chop.

He is also to be involved with a new greens committee to be established by the MGA and will be more actively involved in marking of courses for tournaments and with golf rules. Bud Foster will be chairman of the rules group. □

Golf to be included in Manitoba Summer Games as the "Family Sport"

The Manitoba Summer Games are designed to stimulate greater participation in amateur sport across the province. These games provide a stimulus for the growth and strengthening of local, regional and provincial programs.

For the first time, golf has been selected as one of the nine sports to participate in the 1988 Manitoba Summer Games.

In October, 1986, the Manitoba Golf Association and the Manitoba Ladies' Golf Association both applied to the Sport Directorate for entry into the games. Golf was not only selected, but it was designated as the "Family Sport" for the games. Golf will consist of both male and female categories ranging from 13 and under to 65 and over.

The summer of 1987 will see only regional games being run, but in 1988

both regional and provincial finals will be held. The site of the provincial finals will be the Eastman Region, more specifically Pinawa/Beausejour.

Since the games are emphasizing the participation rather than the competitive part of the sport, there will be two eligibility requirements for individuals.

First, the participants need not have an established handicap and second, anyone who has participated in any Provincial Championship since 1984 will not be allowed to compete.

Hopefully, these games will bring the golfing populace in the province closer together as a whole. Meeting different people from within your own region as well as across the province, will make the games an experience which will not be forgotten for many years to come. □

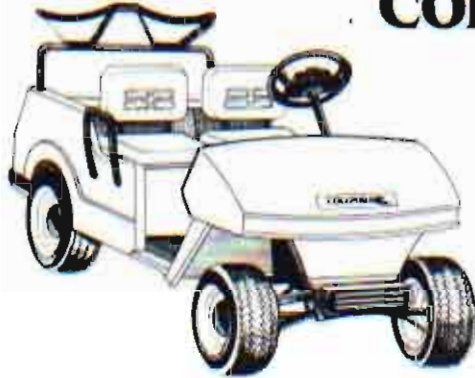
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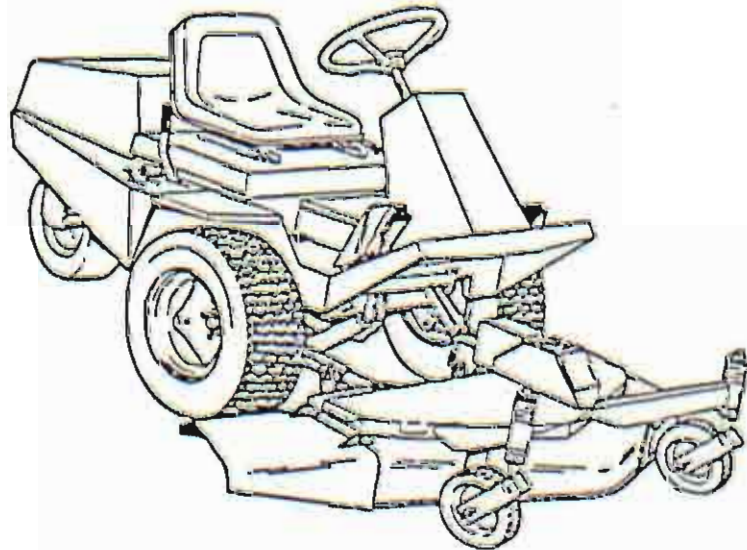

Fanning wins third straight Golfer of the Year award

He lost out in two provincial championships, but his successful defence of the Canadian junior men's title enabled Southwood's Todd Fanning to continue his domination of the Manitoba golf scene in 1986.

For the third straight year, Fanning was selected as the Manitoba Golfer of the Year. The award was presented at the MGA annual meeting in February to his mother, Mrs. Leslie Fanning, because Todd was unable to attend due to his university studies.

Fanning won out over provincial men's amateur champion Glen Hnatiuk of Pine Ridge and provincial women's amateur champion Cathy Burton of Harbour View in the 1986 voting.

The three-time golfer of the year had an up-and-down season, but his come-from-behind performance to win his second straight Canadian junior men's championship at Edmonton proved to be a deciding factor.

At home, he was runner-up in both the provincial amateur and junior championships and was a member of both the Willingdon Cup and junior teams for Manitoba.

He also set three course records during the season, at Falcon Lake, Glendale and Southwood.

Hnatiuk's 1986 season was highlighted with the provincial amateur title, which he won by pulling away in the final round to defeat Fanning after both had put on a dazzling display of sub-par golf in the second round of the tournament.

He finished second to Fanning in the Willingdon team trials and was also winner of a late-season event, the North-eastern Open at Pine Falls.

Burton was the outstanding female golfer in the province in 1986, winning both the provincial amateur and City and District championships. She was also a semifinalist in the United States Public Links championship in 1986.

She went on to place sixth in the

Canadian women's amateur championship and was selected as one of three golfers to represent Canada in international competition in Australia last fall.

She was also named to Canada's two-member team (with former Manitoba golfer of the year Gail Anderson, now of Kelowna, B.C.) for international play at Cali, Colombia, this spring.

Fanning became the first three-time winner in the 12-year history of the Manitoba Golfer of the Year award. Previous double winners were Terry Hashimoto of St. Charles in 1976 and 1980 and Bill Parker, who won out of Elmhurst in 1979 and out of Breezy Bend in 1982.

The honor went to female golfers twice — Shauna Gechel of Breezy Bend in 1981 and Gail Anderson of St. Charles in 1983.

The other winners were Matt Poleschuk of Pine Ridge in 1975, Jimmy King of Elmhurst in 1977 and Terry More of Elmhurst in 1978. □

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Course ratings, Amateur Status, Rules under review

MGA's man about rules

E.K. (Bud) Foster of Elmhurst, was named an Honorary Governor of the Royal Canadian Golf Association at the annual meeting in February, in recognition of his many years of service as a Manitoba representative to the national body.

A past president of the Manitoba Golf Association (1979), Foster has been active in the areas of amateur status, course rating and rules for the RCGA and MGA.

Here, he reviews some interesting aspects of those three areas for the general interest of Manitoba golfers.

The rules of amateur status are, or should be, posted in the clubhouse of every Royal Canadian Golf Association member club in the country.

It spells out clearly who is and isn't an amateur by his actions on or off the golf course.

When top amateur Nick Weslock was working on an instructional book in 1984-85, he learned he could not earn money from the sales of his book.

The RCGA decided he was a golfer first and a writer second. That is, he would be profiting from his name as a golfer. As an amateur, he is not allowed to earn money in this way. To do so, he learned, he would have to forfeit his amateur status and become a non-amateur.

Weslock agreed to share royalties from the sale of his book on an equal basis between the Junior Development Fund and the Scholarship program of the Canadian Golf Foundation. He thereby solved the problem.

Amateurs are allowed to compete in tournaments where prizes do not exceed a retail value of \$400.

Golfers accepting hole-in-one prizes or accepting expense money in a non-RCGA-sponsored event exceeding this limit are in violation of Rule 1-4 and are subject to losing their amateur standing until application is made to the amateur study committee for reinstatement.

Course Rating

The Manitoba Golf Association has a course rating committee that goes to as many of the courses as possible to give them a rating.

All courses start with a standard yard rating. To state it simply, it is the total yardage of the course divided by 200 and with the figure 38.5 added. (Example: Course yardage 6,000 yards, divided by 200 = 30 + 38.5 = 68.5)

On most courses, the actual rating is very close to the yardage rating. However, on courses where there are many bunkers in play or a lot of water, points are added. For example, Glen Abby is rated at 75.4 and the PGA West course is 77.1, though the length of each is about 7,000 yards, which would work out to 73.5 on yardage alone.

Courses are rated so handicaps can be assigned and players visiting another course can enter his scores at his home course on his handicap chart or computer, regardless of where he plays in Canada (but not in the United States).

The USGA has approved the Slope System, which takes as its starting point that our system is not accurate enough for players going from a relatively easy course to a hard one.

However, the work involved and bodies needed are, to the RCGA Handicap Committee's point of view, not very productive. If the USGA system proves out, it could leave to some rethinking in the RCGA.

More money, extra day for 1987 Manitoba Open

There will be more money, an extra day of play and some new sponsors when a field of top professionals tee it up in the 1987 Manitoba Open golf championship.

Southwood Golf and Country Club will again be the site for the '87 Open, which will be played July 29 - Aug. 2, a couple of weeks earlier than it has been held in recent years.

The expansion of the tournament to 72 holes from the previous 54 and the increase in the prize money to \$75,000 has moved the Manitoba Open into the big time.

The tournament becomes eligible for the "Sony Rankings" which are used to determine the top players in the world and to identify the top golf tournaments.

Pacific Western Airlines, which has been a sponsor, carries on as a major backer under the new corporate name of Canadian Airlines International.

ICG Liquid Gas Ltd. returns from the 1986 list of major sponsors, while Keystone Ford Sales Limited replaces Budget Car and Truck Rental and The Bay becomes a fourth major backer of the event.

The 1987 Open also will have several new levels of corporate involvement.

Associate sponsors are Blackwood Beverages Limited and Labatt's Manitoba Brewery, returning in the same roles as last year.

There are also Gold, Silver and Bronze Patrons to support the tournament. The Gold category is a new one, providing participants with an association with a particular hole on the golf course.

The Silver level provides recognition of the individuals, organizations and corporations supporting the Open and en-

titles the holder to an opportunity to play in the Sponsors' Invitational Pro-Am event, to be held July 28.

Bronze patrons are individuals, organizations or corporations who wish to support the Open through the purchase of blocks of tickets for the event.

Brian MacPherson, who served as tournament chairman for the Southwood Manitoba Open committee for the past two years, is president of the Southwood club this year and will continue to be involved. Dave Morphy is the chairman of the club's organizing committee this year.

Dan Halldorson, Manitoba's favorite native son on the pro golf circuit and a four-time winner of the Manitoba Open, is committed to return and hopes to attract a contingent of notable golfers to play in the event.

Dave Barr of Kelowna, B.C., who now plays out of the Kananaskis course in Alberta, is also a hopeful entrant.

With several other events also providing larger purses and a couple of new tournaments coming on the scene, the Tournament Players Division of the Canadian Professional Golfers Association has seen a rebirth of a Canadian tour and most of the top players in the country can be expected to take part, along with a number from the United States and other nations.

The TPD will again be involved with a Junior-Pro day prior to the Open and members will take part in a clinic to be presented during the Open.

"All of our tournament players are really looking forward to returning to the Manitoba Open again this year," said Bob Beauchemin, executive director of the TPD. "It is certainly one of the most enjoyable tournaments on the Canadian tour." □

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Bob Panasik wins playoff for Manitoba Open title

Par took a pounding in the early stages and it took a dramatic finish and a two-hole playoff to determine the winner.

When it was over, the 1986 edition of the Manitoba Open was right in tune with some of the season's major golf events. Just like the Masters, the U.S. Open and the Canadian Open, this one was won by a golfer in his mid-40s.

Forty-four-year-old Bob Panasik of Windsor, Ont., was below regulation figures on all three trips around the par-70 Southwood Golf and Country Club layout to finish with a 54-hole total of 204, six under par.

He then emerged from a three-man

playoff to win the title on the second extra hole and claim the \$10,000 top prize from the biggest and best Manitoba Open ever played.

Four-time champion Dan Halldorson of Brandon and Daniel Talbot of St. Basile, Que., also finished with 204, but lost out to Panasik in the playoff.

Halldorson was eliminated after three-putting for a bogey on the first hole, then Talbot missed a short putt on the second to allow Panasik to win with a second par.

But, the real drama took place a little earlier as the final round came to a finish. First, Halldorson played a sensational over-the-trees pitch to the green

then sank a 35-foot putt on the 18th hole for a three-under-par 67 and a 204 total, the leader in the clubhouse.

Panasik and Talbot, playing in the final two threesomes, both birdied the 17th and 18th holes to also finish with 204 and force the playoff.

The champion finished with a 69 for the day to go with earlier rounds of 69 and 66. Halldorson's 67 went with earlier rounds of 66 and 74. Talbot was the 36-hole leader on scores of 62 and 69 for 131, but slipped to 73 in the third trip.

The tournament opened in sensational style as long-hitting Kelly Murray

of Vancouver, the 1982 Manitoba Open champ, fired a record 10-under-par 60 to grab the first-round lead as no less than 28 players bettered par.

Talbot's eight-under-par 62, which he called his "dream game," proved only good enough for second place.

Halldorson and Bernie Starchuk of Oakville, Ont., were third with six-under-par 64s and there were three more players at 66, five at 67, ten at 68 and six at 69 to complete the onslaught on par on a perfect day for golf.

Nine more matched par with 70 and another 13 golfers finished just one over par with 71s.

Murray's fantasy round included eight birdies, one eagle and nine pars. There were no bogeys and he didn't have a five on his card. It was all 3s and 4s except for a birdie two on the 13th hole. His nines were 29-31 over the 35-35 course.

Talbot's 62 was also free of bogeys with nines of 31-31. He had four birdies and two eagles to go with 12 pars. That round had equalled what had been the competitive course record, set by Breezy Bend assistant pro Dave Rhodes.

Murray's 60 shattered that mark and also beat the non-competitive record of 61 which had been recorded only a week earlier by Canadian junior champion Todd Fanning of Southwood.

Talbot's 69 and 131 total moved him into the lead on the second day as Murray slipped to 73 for 133. Bill Swartz of Brampton, Ont., carded 65 to go with an opening 67 to finish between them with 132.

At that stage, Panasik was in a tie in fourth place with 135, joined by Hendrik Buhrmann of South Africa, who shot 70-65. Amateur Brian Clark of Brandon, who had his second straight two-under-par 68, was tied with Milwaukee's Bill Kokott and Frank Edmonds of Thunder Bay at 136 and Halldorson settled at 137, tied with Roger Klatt, an unattached pro from Winnipeg, and former hockey star Doug Lecuyer of Edmonton.

Clark faded to a 12-over-par 82 in his final round to slip to a tie for third in the race for the tournament's amateur honors.

The top prize went to Southwood's Chris Nelson, who shot 73-69-73 for 215, one ahead of Dan Scanlon of John Blumberg, whose 216 was made up of rounds of 73-68-75. Jim Doyle of Sandy Hook shot 72-72-74 for 218, the same total as Clark.

Panasik was Canadian junior champion when he was 16. He's a former Canadian PGA champ, won the national club pro title in the past and has won several provincial opens. He was mak-

ing his first appearance in the Manitoba Open in about 10 years.

While disappointed that his bid for a fifth Manitoba Open title failed after being so close, Halldorson said he felt lucky to be in a playoff.

"I only hit two or three solid iron shots

today and other than an eagle on the 10th hole, I didn't do anything great," he said after the tournament wound up.

"I had 14 bogeys during this tournament and that's too many on this course. It's too short and too easy to be doing that."

Talbot, who slipped in the final round,

had a simple explanation for his failure to win: "I blew it," he exclaimed. "Of course, I'm disappointed," he said, "but I just didn't play as well today and I was missing a lot of little putts."

Panasik spoke of slipping out of the lead by using four putts on the 13th hole

of his final round for a double-bogey five.

"It just shows that you really can four-putt a green and still get into a playoff — and win," he said.

He added that he was pumped up for the playoff. "You're playing for a difference of \$5,500 and that's enough to

get your attention," he said. "You just have to go after everything, because anyone can win in a playoff."

The champion also had plenty of praise for everyone connected with the 1986 Manitoba Open. The Manitoba Golf Association, the Southwood committee and even the fans came in for some credit for making the event a resounding success.

He called it "the best-run provincial open golf tournament I've ever attended" and said he looked forward to returning to defend his title in 1987.

And, in case you were wondering, yes, it's the same Bob Panasik who used to play. He just dropped the "u" from his name because "I got tired of it being misspelled, so I decided to make it simple." □

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Glen Hnatiuk claims Manitoba Amateur honors

Glen Hnatiuk, a 21-year-old university student from Selkirk playing out of the Pine Ridge Golf Club, emerged as a runaway winner, but there were several others in the earlier spotlight before the 1986 Manitoba Amateur golf championship was decided.

Hnatiuk claimed the title with a 72-hole score of 275, the lowest score ever recorded since the provincial championship has been determined by medal score.

It was also 10 strokes better than runner-up Todd Fanning of Southwood, though the two had been tied for the lead going into the final round of what had been an exciting contest.

The 1986 Manitoba Amateur story is best told in chronological order because it had many interesting developments.

It started July 7 when the low handicappers played at the John Blumberg municipal course, while the others were at Glendale Country Club.

Randy Folk, a 24-year-old Saskatoon golfer, was first in the spotlight as he posted a two-under-par 69 at Blumberg, a course he had never seen before. It was the only sub-par score of the opening day.

The closest rivals in that first round were Jack McDiarmid of Niakwa, Carl Lechman of Rossmere and Craig Kindrat of Pine Ridge, each with 71. Six

players had 72s and Hnatiuk and Fanning were in a group of seven who shot 73.

Of the group playing their first game at Glendale, Robin Leslie of Southwood was the leader with a two-over-par 72.

Day Two was a day for par-busting and the Glendale layout took a pounding from the cream of Manitoba's amateur golfers.

Reigning Canadian junior champion Fanning led the way as 15 players turned in scores of par or better on an ideal day and playing a well-groomed course.

The 18-year-old Fanning established a record for the Glendale course as it was played last year (there have been changes this year), posting a sizzling six-under-par 64.

But, he was only one stroke ahead of Hnatiuk, who turned in a five-under-par 65 playing in the same threesome as Fanning.

The third member of the group, Garth Collings of Breezy Bend, also got in on the assault on Glendale's par with a one-under-par 69.

As a threesome, Fanning, Hnatiuk and Collings had a best-ball score of 56, an amazing 14 under par.

Fanning had five birdies and an eagle and only one bogey (a three-pull) to go with 11 pars; Hnatiuk had seven birdies, offset by two bogeys; Collings had an eagle and five birdies, but also had two bogeys and a double-bogey.

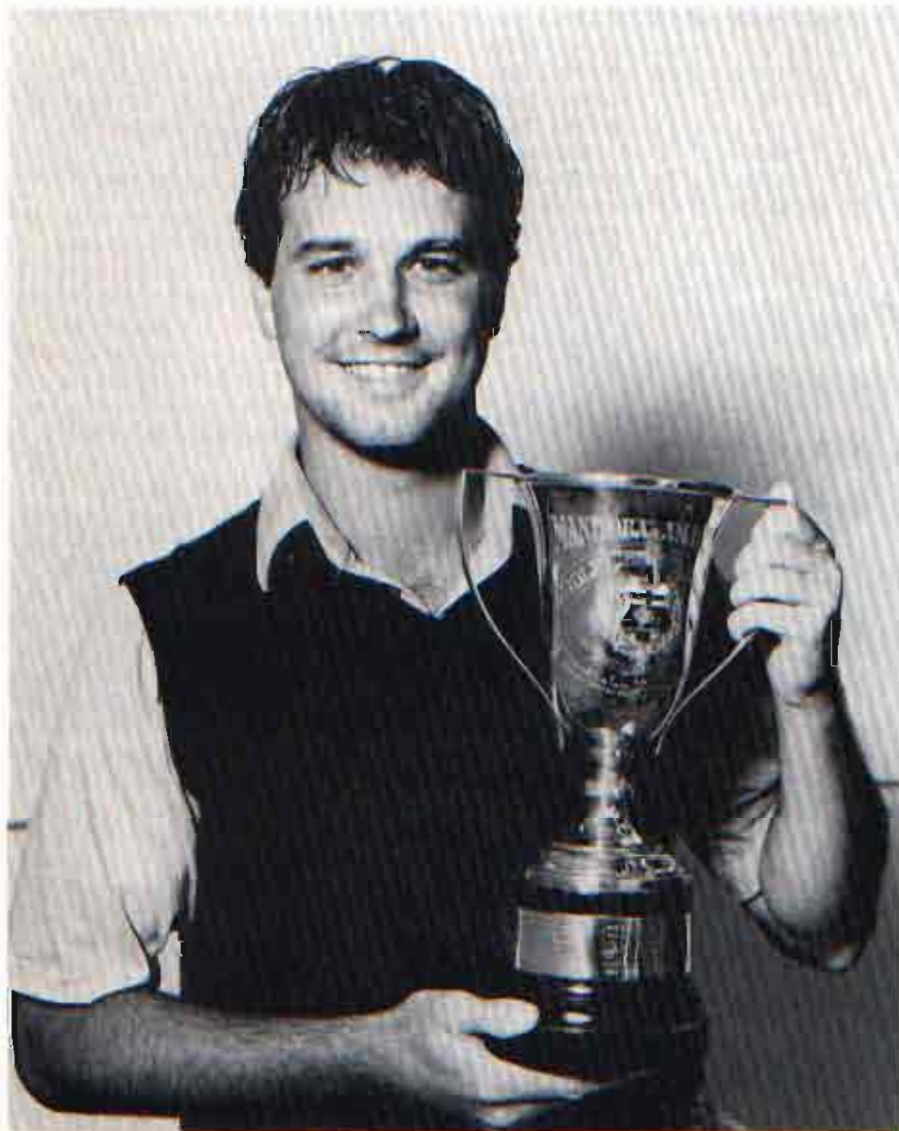
Another Saskatoon golfer, Brad Birnie (who won the Saskatchewan Amateur title a few days earlier) grabbed a share of the spotlight with a four-under-par 66 to get into contention after shooting an embarrassing 79 at Blumberg.

The other sub-par games on Day Two were 68s by Dave Lavalles of Falcon Beach and Rob Oilphant and Gary Kullman of Rossmere and a 69 by Don Jackson of Portage.

The action left Fanning at the head of the pack at the halfway mark with 137, followed by Hnatiuk at 138, first-day leader Folk at 139 (matching par at Glendale), Kindrat and Lavallee at 141 and Lechman at 142.

The scoring wasn't as hot on Day Three, as Hnatiuk had the only sub-par effort, a one-under-par 69, which allowed him to pull into a tie with Fanning, who matched par with 70.

It left the pair deadlocked with 54-hole scores of 207 and they moved five shots

ahead of Folk, who shot 73 for a 212 total.

Collings shot 71 to move into fourth place with 214, while Birnie had 70 to get into a five-way tie in fifth place with Lechman, Kindrat, Jimmy Doyle of San-

dy Hook and Glenn Collins of St. Charles.

Day Four dawned cloudy and wet, but Hnatiuk ignored the steady rain and used a string of four consecutive birdies on the front nine on the way to a two-under-par 68 for his 275 total.

Fanning got off to a cool start and never got it going in the rain. He shot a final-round 78 and wound up 10 behind Hnatiuk, still good enough for the runner-up honors.

Kindrat and Folk shared third place with 287. Doyle and Birnie were tied in fifth place with 288, and Glendale's Jeff Helper, Southwood's Gerry Dubanski and Rossmere's Gary Kullman shared seventh with 289.

While the championship flight was continuing with medal play on the final two days, four other flights featured two days of match play and Glendale golfers were in the spotlight.

Irving Averbach, a former Glendale member now playing out of another Glendale club in Edmonton, was the first-flight winner; David Wolch won the second flight for Glendale; and Neil Stedman of Glendale was runner-up in the fourth flight, which was won by Rod Murray of Bel Acres. The third flight was won by Trevor Unger of Rossmere.

WILLINGDON TEAM TRIALS

With Folk and Birnie ineligible, 23 golfers with 72-hole totals of 296 and under were invited to carry their scores into the final two rounds of play for berths on the Manitoba Willingdon Cup team.

Fanning moved back into the spotlight in those two rounds at Niakwa Country Club as he returned to his par-breaking form with rounds of 70 and 68 over the par-72 layout. It gave him a six-round total of 423 and the No. 1 spot on the provincial team.

Hnatiuk shot 75-76 for 426 to take the second berth and Kindrat, his Selkirk and Pine Ridge colleague, had 69-72 to grab the third spot with 428.

The big battle was waged for the final team berth before Bruce North of Carman came through to take the spot after coming close several times in the past. He became the only rookie on the team.

North shot 72-73 at Niakwa to finish with 436, ahead of Doyle, Kullman, Collings and White, who were deadlocked with 437, only a stroke away from forcing a playoff.

It marked the second appearances on the Manitoba team for both Fanning and Hnatiuk, while Kindrat made his third trip. Hnatiuk was the only repeater from the 1985 team.

CANADIAN AMATEUR

At the Canadian Amateur championship and Willingdon Cup interprovincial team play at the Mactaquac Provincial Park Golf Course at Fredericton, N.B., the Manitoba team made a fine showing to share second place.

Kindrat paced the team with rounds of 71-72 over the difficult 6,975-yard par-72 course to help Manitoba to a two-day total of 440, 10 behind the winning Alberta team, but tied with Ontario in second place and a stroke ahead of fourth-place British Columbia.

Hnatiuk and North both shot 75 to go with Kindrat's 71 as the three scores that were counted in the first round for a total of 221. Fanning's first-round 80 was the score dropped.

The 221 left Manitoba in fourth place as B.C. led with 215, followed by Alberta with 218 and Prince Edward Island with 220.

On the second day, Fanning and Kindrat both matched par with 72 and North had another 75, while Hnatiuk's 77 was dropped. The total was 219, third best for the day behind Alberta's 212 and Ontario's 217.

All four Manitoba team members qualified for the final 36 holes of play in the Canadian Amateur championship, Kindrat with 143, North 150 and Fanning and Hnatiuk both with 152.

North was the only Canadian golfer to post par with 72 in his third round, while Kindrat had 75, Hnatiuk 77 and Fanning 79. In the final round, Kindrat had another 75, North slipped to 81, Fanning had 80 and Hnatiuk 82.

Kindrat finished sixth out of the starting field of 106 players in the Canadian Amateur with his 72-hole total of 293, seven strokes behind champion Brent Franklin of Calgary, who shot 70-67-77-72—286.

North's 303 total was good for a tie in 17th place, while Hnatiuk and Fanning both finished with 311, tied in 40th position. □

National Senior competitions hold local spotlight in 1986

Senior golfers were in the spotlight on the Manitoba golf scene in 1986 with three separate national senior competitions held in Winnipeg.

The Royal Canadian Golf Association's Senior Men's championship and interprovincial team matches attracted a whopping entry of 320 as it was played Sept. 4-6 at the Elmhurst and Pine Ridge clubs.

Elmhurst also wound up as the host club for the Canadian Ladies' Golf Association senior championship events at the end of July when heavy rains made the course unplayable at Niakwa, the scheduled host club.

Also in July, Southwood was the scene for the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association Manulife Senior championship.

SENIOR MEN

Bob Wylie of Calgary successfully defended his Canadian Senior Men's championship and also led his Alberta squad to the team championship.

Gord Lenton of Pine Ridge shared the first-day lead with Wylie and finished tied for runner-up honors in the individual championship.

Wylie opened with a two-under-par 70 at Pine Ridge, then shot two-over-par 73 in both rounds at Elmhurst for a 216 total.

Lenton opened with a one-under-par 70 at Elmhurst, shot 76 at Pine Ridge, then finished with another 76 at Elmhurst for 216 to share second spot with Ed Niziolek of Bellevue, Ont., who had scores of 75-76-71.

Manitoba's Ron Castelane of Niakwa finished fifth with 227 on rounds of 74-75-78, behind Bruce Pelmore of Victoria, who shot 76-75-75—226.

Smiley Meronek of St. Charles claimed low gross honors in the 65-69 age group with 77-80-76—233. Rube Ludwick of Glendale had low net honors in the 75-and-over division with 98-87-92—277, less handicap of 63 for 214.

In team play, Alberta finished on top with 463, one stroke better than British Columbia and two ahead of Quebec.

Manitoba finished fourth in the team scoring with 476, with provincial champion Don McNeill of Niakwa leading the team with 76-79—154. Meronek was next on the Manitoba team with 77-80—157, Nick Mickoski of Elmhurst had 81-83—164 and Harry Critchley of Southwood had 84-89—173.

SENIOR WOMEN

In the Senior Women's competition, Ceil McLaurin of Savannah, Georgia, led all the way to capture the Canadian title with 76-76-79—229, eight shots ahead of runner-up Janice Cain of St. Paul, Minn., who had three 79s for her 237 total. Third spot also went to a U.S. golfer as Nancy Rutter of Buffalo, N.Y., shot 79-80-79 for 238.

Billie Bartley of Richmond, B.C. was low Canadian with 77-79-84 for 240.

Merlene Netterfield of Pine Ridge, the Manitoba senior champion led the Manitobans with 81-83-88—252, tied in 13th place in the overall standings.

Ann Tachan of Elmhurst was next among the Manitobans with 80-86-85—251, Wilma Tait of Elmhurst shot 85-90-90—265, Effie Mason of St. Charles had 90-92-87—269, Vi Halicki of St. Charles shot 87-93-93—271, June Bagley of Southwood had 92-88-92—272, and Shirley Brown of Elmhurst (90-95-89) and Roberta Nicholson of St. Charles (99-87-88) both finished with 274.

The interprovincial team honors went to B.C. with 492, four ahead of Ontario. Saskatchewan was third with 502, Alberta fourth with 509 and Quebec fifth with 524.

Manitoba's team finished in sixth place with 526, led by

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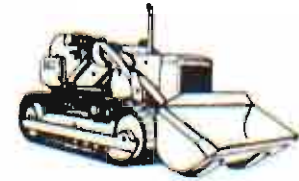

SENIOR PROS

In the senior pro championship at Southwood, Frank Fowler of North Battleford, Sask., ended a seven-year reign of the event by Moe Norman of Gilford, Ont.

Fowler took the honors with rounds of 71-71-72 for a 214 total to claim the \$5,000 top money. That was three ahead of Ron Willey of Delta, B.C., who shot 75-67-75 for 217 and won \$3,500.

Bud Edwards of Falcon Beach, who shot a three-under-par 67 to take the first-day lead, slipped to 80 in his second round, then bounced back with 73 in the final round for a 220 total to share third place with former Manitoban Will Homenuik of Toronto, each winning \$2,750. Homenuik shot 73-75-72.

Norman never threatened in his bid for eight straight titles, shooting 71-74-76—221, tied in fifth place.

Veteran Southwood pro Bill Thomson shared the second-day spotlight. The 76-year-old golfer, oldest in the tournament, toured his home course in one-over-par 71, five strokes below his age. It went with an opening 81 and a third-round 75 to give him a 54-hole score of 227, second-best among the Manitobans and good for a \$675 payday as he finished tied for 14th.

Several Manitoba pros picked up some of the age-group prize money, with golfers winning in the main part not eligible for the special prizes.

Rossmere's Gerry Morrissey was second and MacGregor native Len MacDonald (playing out of Kananaskis in Alberta) was third in the 50-54 group; Niakwa's Chick Duncan was first and Len Haughey of Stony Mountain second in the 60-64 division. □



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Bob Genoway claims Rural Amateur title

Bob Genoway of Morden made his third try for the Manitoba Rural Amateur golf championship a successful one.

The 29-year-old provincial recreational worker, who is also a zone representative on the MGA Council, captured the 1986 rural title when he toured the Hecla Island course August 17 and 18 in rounds of 74 and 75 for a 36-hole total of 149.

That was three strokes better than Ian Hunt of Swan River and 1979 champ Larry Johnston of Dauphin, who shared the runner-up position with 152.

The watery 17th hole played a big role in the final outcome as Hunt surrendered the lead as he plunked two balls into the pond to take a quadruple-bogey eight in the second round.

Hunt, who was tied with Genoway after the first round with 74, had a two-stroke lead on that 17th tee, but was two behind Genoway on the 18th tee after the Morden golfer registered a par four.

Genoway finished with a birdie-three on the final hole for his 75 and the 149 total for a three-stroke edge. Hunt survived a countback to take second place ahead of Johnston.

Genoway, who plays out of Minnewasta Golf Club at Morden, came close a year earlier, shooting 151 to tie Phil Hall of Brandon, then losing a five-hole playoff in driving rain. In his first try in 1984, Genoway placed sixth.

"This is a lot happier finish than last year," the champion said. Referring to Hunt, he added: "I stayed close to him all the way, but it was Ian's tough luck on the 17th that finally let me get ahead."

Hunt was disappointed in the turn of events, but shrugged it off with: "That's golf. I never had a bad tee shot until that one on 17 and that's where I lost it."

Hunt finished the second round with 78 for his 152. Johnston had best second-round score of 74 after a first-round 78 for his 152.

Fourth place went to Melvin Biluk of Sandy Hook with 78-76—154 after a countback to break a tie with 1984 champion Ted Chop of Northernnaire, Tim Cromarty of Selkirk and Dale Wallace of the Brandon Wheat City club. Chop and Cromarty both shot 76-78, Wallace was 75-79.

Barrie Sanders of Carman, who had the responsibility of running the tournament as MGA vice-president in charge of

rural activities, found time to win his sixth straight rural senior championship with 78-81—159.

He also had problems on the 17th hole with two tee shots in the water to take a five-over-par nine, but he had a big enough lead to survive that disaster.

Mervyn Minish of Swan River was runner-up with 81-82—163, good for the age-group honors in the 55-64 division. Third was Bud Miller of Carman, who had 85-81—166, tops in the 65-and-over age group. Peter Neufeld of Northernnaire was fourth with 81-87—168.

The rural tournament had a total of 154 entries—135 in the amateur and 19 in the senior portion. The event was blessed with ideal weather conditions. It took a score of 78 or better to qualify for the championship flight.

Randy Spence of Selkirk topped the first flight with 79-76—159, three better than clubmate Dean Iwanoczko and Bruce Schade of Cottonwood, both with 80-78—158.

The second flight went to Larry Davidson of Morden with 82-76—158, ahead of George Panagiolou of Brandon with 159 and Guy Lambert of Cottonwood with 162.

In the third flight, Bob Bingham of Steinbach led the way with 86-79—165, ahead of Bill Boivin of Pinawa with 169 and Don Revel of Carman with 171.

Daniel Racicot of Selkirk won the fourth flight after a countback when he and Dave Goerz of Morden both carded 88-85—173. Brent Kurbis of Selkirk was third with 175.

The fifth flight was won by Dave Wallace of Brandon with 92-81—173, followed by Jim Sorenson of Gladstone with 176 and Garry Dyck of Winkler with 179.

Marshall Giesbrecht of Sandy Hook needed a countback to win over Ron Nadeau of Thompson in the sixth flight as both finished with 181. Giesbrecht shot 94-87, Nadeau had 95-86. John Drzysteck of Selkirk was third with 182.

The 1987 Rural Amateur and Senior competitions will again be held at Hecla Island, returning to the traditional dates of August 9-10, the second weekend of the month.

MEAGHER BEEFEATER

Good weather was also featured for the final rural golf event of the season, as 10 teams took part in the annual Meagher Beefeater Inter-Zone final September 7 at Shilo.

The Northernnaire club from the Interlake zone captured the honors, beating out the host Shilo team from the Westman zone.

Shilo will again be the host club for the 1987 Meagher event on September 6.

A new tournament on the rural scene this year will be the first Rural Junior championship tournament, to be played June 30 at Steinbach. □

Don McNeill captures Senior crown in first try

For the third time in the last five years, the Manitoba Senior Men's golf championship has been claimed by a "rookie" player.

In his first year of eligibility for the 55-and-over event, Niakwa's Don McNeill claimed the 1986 title with a 54-hole score of 224 at the Breezy Bend Golf and Country Club July 29-31.

Nick Mickoski of Elmhurst in 1983 and Gord Lenton of Pine Ridge in 1982

also won in their rookie years in senior company.

While McNeill took the final bows, several other golfers shared some of the headlines along the way during the three days of competition.

Mickoski was the first-day leader, the only player in the field of 161 able to match Breezy Bend's par 72. Lenton was on his heels with 73 and Niakwa's Ron Castelane was next with 74. McNeill started with a disappointing 79.

The second day saw Castelane grab the spotlight with a three-over-par 75 to go with his opening 74 for a leading 149 total. Don Forsythe of Breezy Bend, with two straight 75s, was next at 150.

Meanwhile, McNeill fired the day's best score, par 72, and climbed into contention, tied in third place with Mickoski, who slipped to 79; Lenton, who needed 78; former two-time champion Smiley Meronek of St. Charles, who had 77-74; and Gestur Kristjansson, also of St. Charles, who carded 75-76.

McNeill again had the best score of the final day, a one-over-par 73 (despite bogeys on the final four holes). It gave him a 54-hole score of 224 and a comfortable four-stroke edge on Meronek, who finished with a 77 for a total of 228.

Mickoski survived a two-stroke penalty to shoot 79 and finish with 230, good enough for a share of third place with veteran Harry Critchley of Southwood, a six-time former Manitoba senior champion, who had rounds of 77-76-77 for his 230.

Those four golfers made up the Manitoba team for the Canadian senior interprovincial championships, played later at the Elmhurst Country Club.

Forsythe slipped to 81 in his final round to just miss a team berth with 231, while Castelane skidded to 83 and finished at 232, tied in sixth place with Kristjansson, who closed with 81, and Breezy Bend's Marty Malcovish, with a final 77.

Lenton slipped to 82 in the final round to finish with 233 in ninth place. Tied in 10th place were Bud McCormick of Niakwa and Jerry Jerrett of Elmhurst, both with 234.

With McNeill the overall winner, Mickoski's 230 was good for low gross honors in the 55-59 age division, with McCormick claiming the net honors.

The 60-64 gross honors were shared by Kristjansson and Malcovish, with Breezy Bend's Ralph Nixon taking the net prize.

Critchley claimed the low gross honors in the 65-69 division, since Meronek won the overall runner-up prize. Bert Campbell of Harbour View was the net winner.

In the 70-and-over division, Cass Tobin of Elmhurst was the winner with a 36-hole total of 158. The net honors went to Southwood's Eric Dobie.

Bud McCormick had the low score of the day and led his Niakwa team to the championship as 33 teams participated in the 1986 Senior Inter-Club championship September 11 at Carman.

McCormick's par 72 was supported by a 76 from Ron Castelane and a 77 from provincial senior champ Don McNeill to give the Niakwa team a total of 225.

St. Boniface finished second with 229 as Mike Lenton carded 75, Russ Jones had 76 and Murray Brown contributed 78.

Two Carman golfers were next in line in the individual scoring: John Martens with 73 and Barrie Sanders with 74. Len Brown of Pine Ridge shot 75.

In net scoring, Rossmere and Selkirk finished in a deadlock at 209, with Rossmere getting the nod after a count-back. Rossmere had net scores of 68 from Ed Klein, 70 from Doug McPherson and 71 from Bob Hilderman, while Selkirk's total included 66 from Adam Kell, 67 from John Uskiw and 76 from Dave Allen. □

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Parker tops in Manitoba; Fanning best in Canada

Southwood's Todd Fanning, in his final year of junior eligibility, and Rossmere's Scott Parker, with three more years of junior play ahead of him, shared the Manitoba junior golf spotlight in 1986.

Parker prevented Fanning from claiming a third straight Manitoba junior crown, but Fanning later made a great comeback to settle for a second straight national junior title.

MANITOBA CHAMPIONSHIP

The 15-year-old Parker defied the odds as he grabbed the first-day lead then held on to lead all the way to win the Manitoba Junior championship in July at Bel Acres.

Fanning, 18, had won the provincial junior title in the two previous seasons and also was Manitoba Amateur king in 1984. After also winning the Canadian junior title in 1985, he was heavily favoured to win his third straight Manitoba junior crown.

Parker opened the Manitoba test with a one-under-par 71, five better than the defending champion, who found four other players ahead of him after the first round.

Southwood's Colin Drewe, 16, and Wayne Sawchuk, 17, of Kenora, followed Parker with 74s and Jeff Helper, 17, of Glendale and Glenn Bayne, 18, of Breezy Bend, were next with 75s. Gerald Morrissey of Rossmere and Jamie Bristow of Breezy Bend joined Fanning with 76.

Fanning looked like he was set to run away with his third title as he played the first eight holes two under par. However,

a quadruple-bogey eight on the ninth hole did him in.

The defending champ turned in the best score of the second day, a three-under-par 69 to edge closer to the leader, but Parker matched par with 72 to stay in front. His 143 total was two better than Fanning's 145, which was three ahead of Rossmere's Dave McMillan, whose 71 was the only other sub-par game in the second round.

Day Two also saw the winners proclaimed in the two younger age categories of the tournament. Fourteen-year-old Dale Goehring of Breezy Bend topped the 13-14 division with 78-76—154, two better than Jeff Lailey of Elmhurst, who shot 78-78—156.

In the 12-and-under group, 11-year-old James Kadyniuk of Southwood took the honors with 87-94—181, ahead of Owen Fawcett of Breezy Bend, who had 96-90—186.

Parker admitted to some luck as he maintained the lead after the third round of the junior test. He and Fanning both carded 79s so Parker stayed two shots ahead with a three-day total of 222, while Fanning was joined by McMillan at 224 after McMillan carded a 76. Helper and Drewe were next with 225.

Parker's lucky shot came on the 519-yard par-five 12th hole at Bel Acres, where he registered an eagle three.

"I skulled it and it hit the flagstick and went in," Parker said of the shot that kept him in the lead. "I think it might have gone off the green if it didn't hit the stick."

The 15-year-old refused to crack as the battle for the title went right to the wire in the final round. Parker shot 77, Fanning had 76 and the Rossmere golfer was a one-stroke winner, finishing with a 72-hole total of 299 while Fanning had 300.

Drewe also shot 76 in his final round to settle into third place with 301, while Helper and McMillan, who shot 77 and 78 respectively, were next at 302.

There was a six-stroke gap back to Brandon's Tom Relf at 308, then came Rob Guthrie of Glendale at 310 and Bayne at 312. Two younger players rounded out the top 10 — 13-year-old Lailey and 14-year-old Goehring tied at 313.

JUNIOR TEAM TRIALS

Parker and Fanning continued their neck-and-neck battle as the top 16 players moved on to the provincial junior team trials at Elmhurst.

Both matched par with 71 in the first round of the trials, then Parker sewed up the No. 1 position with a steady 74 in the final round while Fanning closed with 77. It gave Parker a six-round total of 444; Fanning had 448.

McMillan had the best score of the final round, a one-over-par 72, to move up to third place with 451, and the fourth berth on the team went to Drewe, who slipped to 81 in his final round to finish at 455.

It gave Manitoba a young team to go to the Canadian junior championship in Edmonton in defence of the national team title earned by Manitoba in 1985 at Rossmere. Parker was 15, Drewe 16, McMillan 17 and Fanning 18.

They also won berths on the eight-member team to take part in the annual Manitoba-Minnesota matches, along with Helper, Guthrie, Relf and Sawchuk, the next four finishers.

Also named after the championship was the Manitoba team for the Western Canada junior team matches at Saskatoon. That team included Mike Derksen, 17, of Southwood; Dale

Goehring, 14, of Breezy Bend; Jeff Lailey, 13, of Elmhurst; and Brad Collett, 16, of Portage la Prairie.

CANADIAN JUNIOR

In the Canadian Junior championship at Edmonton's Windermere Golf and Country Club in August, defending champion Fanning had a nine-over-par 80 in the first round and was 10 strokes behind the leading Dan Dupuis of Trail, B.C.

He stormed back with a three-under-par 68 in the second round and was one-under-par 70 in the third trip to pull into the lead with a 54-hole total of 218, followed by Garney Vezina of Boischatel, Que., at 219 and Dupuis at 220.

He closed with a three-over-par 74 in the final round for 292 and a one-stroke victory over David Morland of Thornhill, Ont., who matched par with 71 to move up to the runner-up position. Dupuis finished another stroke back after matching Fanning's 74 in the final round. Jean-Francois Laverdure of Rosemere, Que., closed with a 71 to finish fourth at 295. Vezina slipped to seventh with a closing 79.

Helper of Glendale was the next best Manitoban, tied for 24th at 309 after rounds of 78-83-72-76. Parker tied for 34th with 311 on rounds of 75-77-82-77. Drewe was 66th with 79-78-77-90—324, and Gerald Morrissey of Rossmere was the only other Manitoban to qualify for the full 72 holes, finishing 71st with 80-81-80-88—329.

In the interprovincial team competition, the Manitobans were unable to make it two in a row, but finished in third place with a total of 458.

Fanning led the team with 80-58—148, Parker had 76-77—153, Drewe was 79-78—157 and McMillan shot 80-83—163.

Quebec won the team title with a two-day total (best three scores each day) of 446 and British Columbia was second with 451. Ontario was fourth, two behind Manitoba with 460.

Fanning received plenty of admiration for his strong comeback to repeat his Canadian championship after the bad start.

"I told Al Gray (MGA vice-president and non-playing captain of the team) that I was gonna win this thing because I was just sick of finishing second this year," Fanning said after the victory.

In addition to his second-place finish in the Manitoba Junior,

he was runner-up to Glen Hnatiuk in the Manitoba Amateur.

"My main goal was to win the Canadian Junior again, then my other goals were the Manitoba Amateur and Manitoba Junior championships," he said. "After I lost both of those, I just had to work for this one."

MANITOBA-MINNESOTA MATCHES

Manitoba's team swamped the Minnesota counterparts in the sixth annual Manitoba-Minnesota matches played in early August at Elmhurst.

The Manitobans scored an unprecedented sweep of all four team matches to take an 8-0 lead in the first day. The competition was closer than the score indicates, however, as Fanning and Parker both scored birdies on the 18th hole to give their respective teams one-up victories.

In the singles matches the next day, the Manitobans won 5½ to 2½ to win the two-day test by a total of 13½ to 2½, the biggest margin in the history of the event. Manitoba now holds a 4-1 edge with one match tied.

The 1987 Manitoba-Minnesota matches will be played in Minnesota.

WESTERN CANADIAN JUNIOR B

It took a three-hole playoff before Mike Derksen of Southwood captured the Western Canadian Junior B golf

championship at the Riverside Country Club in Saskatoon.

Derksen had rounds of 72-76-78 for a 54-hole total of 226, a score matched by Brad Vinnick of Saskatoon, but Derksen won on the third extra hole when Vinnick three-putted for a bogey.

In the team competition, Manitoba and Saskatchewan shared the lead after two days, but the home team pulled in front on the final day to finish with a total of 689, 13 strokes better than Manitoba.

JUNIOR INTER-CLUBS

Rossmere captured the honors in the 1986 Manitoba Junior Inter-Club championship, played August 1 at Selkirk.

The Rossmere team had a total of 317, two ahead of Southwood. Selkirk was the rural winner with 320, followed by Dauphin with 335.

Myles Zyblock of Selkirk and Tracy Rebeck of Pine Ridge were the low individual players for the day, both carding 73.

In the Sunday junior inter-club series, 31 teams took part in two preliminary rounds, with 15 qualifying for the final round at Shilo June 29.

Elmhurst topped the final field with 243, just one stroke better than Rossmere. Dauphin led the rural teams with 254, ahead of Selkirk with 267.

JUNIOR CAMPS

Three successful camps were held for junior golfers in 1986 and a similar program is scheduled this season.

Twelve elite players were involved in an instructional camp for advanced players May 17-19. All 12 made the cut in the provincial junior championship, 10 of them in the top 16. Seven of the 12 competed in the Canadian junior, with five qualifying for all four rounds.

A city camp for mid-handicap players was held June 24-25 at John Blumberg with 18 boys in attendance. The ages ranged from 13 to 15, the handicaps varied from 10 to 20.

A rural camp was held July 2-4 at Carman, with 20 taking part. They were also mid-handicap players of varying ages.

MUNDIE PUTTER

The MGA Junior team competed in B Division in the Mundie Putter League during the 1986 season, finishing in third place behind Elmhurst and Southwood.

Participation is looked upon as training for the juniors and a total of 12 players were involved. Nine of them are eligible for play this season. □

For the winning rural team from Carman, Bruce North's 70 was supported by brother Bill with 76 and senior champion Barrie Sanders with 80 for three-man total of 226. Bruce North had four birdies as he had nines of 34-36.

Doyles capture Family Classic honors for third time

For the third time in the tournament's seven-year history, Jim and Pat Doyle of Sandy Hook claimed the major honors in the 1986 North American Life Family Classic.

The Doyles, both former provincial amateur champions, also became the first back-to-back winners of the event, successfully defending the title won in 1985. They also won in 1983.

The 1986 competition was played August 26 at the Steinbach Fly-in Golf Club, the first time on a course outside of Winnipeg. It proved so popular, it will be played again at Steinbach this year, on August 25.

It was also the first time the Doyles had seen the Steinbach course, but they got things going on the back nine to win the A division of the father-son with a two-over-par 74 in the alternate-shot competition, three better than the Pine Ridge pair of Carl and Todd Teplitski, who won the event in 1982.

Thirty-two teams were involved in the father-son A group and the tournament also attracted 27 teams in father-son B, 24 in parent-child and four in mother-daughter divisions for a total entry of 87 teams.

The Doyle twosome had to come from behind to win after shooting 40 on the front nine, while the Teplitski team had 39.

The Sandy Hookers played the back nine in two-under-par 34 for 74, while the Pine Ridgers needed 38 on the back nine for their 77.

Martin and Jonathan Buchwald of Glendale had the only other under-80 score, posting 41-38—79.

In the father-son B division, for handicaps of 13 and higher, Ray and Marc Cadieux of St. Charles took the honors with 42-40—82, three better than Gord and Scott Lenton of Selkirk, who had 45-40—85. In third place were Wray and Doug Taylor with 86.

The parent-child division was won by Eddy and Angela Martens of Altona, playing out of the Oakview Golf Club, who carded 40-41—81 for a one-shot victory over three-time winners Art Smith of St. Boniface and daughter Lynda Palahniuk of Elmhurst, who had nines of 42-40.

Tied in third place with 85 were David and Aileen Robertson of St. Charles, Angus and Heather MacLeod of Canoe Club and Bill and Barb Maslanko of Pine Ridge.

In the mother-daughter category, June and Nancy Bagley of Southwood led the way with 43-41—84, ahead of Irene and Laura Duncan of Nlakwa, who had 47-47—94.

Net honors in the father-son A division went to Ken and Al Brownridge of Elmhurst, who shot 81 and had a combined handicap of 11½ for a net total of 69½. The Buchwalds were next in line with 79-8—71.

In the father-son B group, net honors went to John and Jason McNicholl of Southwood who shot 87 and used a handicap of 18 for a net 69. The Taylors were runners-up with their 86 less a 13 handicap for 73.

Margaret and Jim North of Breszy Bend took the net honors in the parent-child division with 86 less their combined handicap of 17½ for a net score of 68½. The MacLeods were next with 85-16—69.

The Duncans claimed net honors in the mother-daughter competition with a net 94-14—80. □

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Hot putter propels Teplitski to Jack Blair Match Play honors

A hot putter was the key to success for Pine Ridge's Todd Teplitski as he captured both the medal honors and then went on to win the 1986 Jack Blair Memorial match play championship.

The former provincial junior champion, who had been appointed technical director of the Manitoba Golf Association only a few months earlier, led the 36-hole qualifying test by eight strokes and continued his hot play through four rounds of match play.

Using only 27 putts, Teplitski carded a one-under-par 71 at St. Charles Country Club, good for a one-stroke lead in the May 31 opening round. He needed only 26 putts as he scored a two-under-par 70 June 1 at Wildewood, a course he had never played before.

His 141 total was better than Kevin Nicholson of Bel Acres, who had 76 at St. Charles and 71 at Wildewood for 149 in the runner-up position.

Junior Jeff Helper of Glendale, who matched St. Charles par with 72 in his first round, slipped to 82 at Wildewood, but was among the 16 who qualified for match play.

Junior Scott Parker of Rossmere was third on the qualifying list with 79-72—151, followed by six players tied at 153 — Dave Lavallee of Falcon Beach (80-73), Rob Loewen of Rossmere (78-75), Glenn Collins of St. Charles (78-75), Chris Nelson of Southwood (77-76), Ron Simenik of Pine Ridge (77-76) and 1984 Blair champion Ron Wilson of Breezy Bend (73-80).

Joining Helper at 154 was Glen Hnatiuk of Selkirk (78-76), followed by Lane Bickel of St. Charles at 78-77—155 and Ken Warwick of Niakwa (83-73) and David White of Southwood (82-74) at 156.

A playoff was needed to decide the final two match play berths when Rossmere's Carl Lechman (78-79), Elmhurst's Terry More (76-81) and Windsor's Mike Berney (79-78) all finished at 157. Lechman and More won on the first extra hole.

The scene shifted to Pine Ridge for the match play June 10, 12, 17 and 19 and Teplitski's putting stayed hot as he swept to the title.

In the first round, he blitzed More 5-and-4 for the most one-sided victory of the day. At the other end of the scale, Collins had to play six extra holes before defeating Helper on the 24th.

The other first-round matches saw all three Rossmere players bow out as

Nicholson topped Lechman 4-and-3, Simenik defeated Loewen 3-and-2 and White edged Parker 1 up. Warwick defeated Nelson 5-and-3, Lavallee got by Bickel 4-and-2 and Wilson was a 1-up winner over Hnatiuk.

Second-round play saw Teplitski whip Lavallee 6-and-5; White advance on a bye as Wilson was unable to play due to a previous commitment; Collins get by Nicholson 4-and-2; and Warwick defeat Semerik 3-and-1.

In the semi-final round, experience topped youth in both matches as the 25-year-old Teplitski got by 19-year-old White 4-and-2 and 32-year-old Warwick edged 19-year-old Collins 2-and-1.

The hot putter was back in the headlines as Teplitski jumped into a six-up lead in the first seven holes, then coasted to a 5-and-3 victory over Warwick in the final.

The champion used only nine putts on

the first seven holes, firing three birdies and four pars to build his early lead.

Teplitski was behind only once throughout the match play, trailing Lavallee by one after the second hole of the second match. He turned that around for a 6-and-5 win and was never behind again.

Teplitski was pleased with his play through the competition and compared the victory to his previous claim to victory.

"I haven't had that winning feeling since the 1979 Manitoba Junior, when I was ahead right from the start. I was in front in this from the opening qualifying round at St. Charles and I had the same feeling all the way."

The 1987 Blair competition was scheduled for qualifying rounds May 30-31 at Glendale and Wildewood and the match play June 9, 11, 16 and 18 at St. Boniface. □

Morden had Pat Burns as the assigned pro, with amateurs Kent Ehnes, Dan Roch and Bob Fehr.

These six teams captured the amateur merchandise prizes and the pro money for the team scores included \$1,000 for Lazarko, \$800 for Gottfred, \$600 for Roy, \$400 for Brekke and \$150 each for Hunter and Burns.

Ben Smirnov of John Blumberg, who led that municipal club to the Crown Life title in 1984, had the low pro honors for the day, a three-under-par 67, to earn \$200.

The championship Flin Flon team went on to the eighth annual national Crown Life Inter-provincial championship at the Bally Haly Golf and Curling Club at St. John's, Newfoundland, placing fifth in the 10-team competition.

The national honors went to a Quebec

The national Crown Life competition is to be played August 27-28 at St. Catharines, Ontario. St. Charles Country Club in Winnipeg is expected to be the host club for the national event in 1988. □

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Teaching methods standardized

A few years ago, the Canadian Professional Golfer's Association was faced with a problem related to instruction.

There was concern over the lack of continuity in methods and terminology that became evident in studies of the current training of new professionals.

A National Teaching Committee was set up, with a representative from each zone, headed by Jack McLaughlin, one of Canada's finest teachers.

George Knudson, one of Canada's great players (and a former Winnipegger), also joined the committee.

For the past two years, I have had the honor of sitting and working on this committee along with these fine gentlemen.

The committee recommendation was that teaching methods and terminology should be standardized, so that, eventually, most Canadian teaching professionals would be using these methods.

A teaching manual was developed by which assistant professionals are trained and examined.

Knudson has produced a video on the swing motion which

has the endorsement of the CPGA. For every video sold, \$1 goes directly to junior golf in Canada. After just one year on the market, this video has raised more than \$20,000 for juniors.

For the first time in Canada, we are able to announce the formation of junior development camps. This summer, four of Manitoba's best junior players in different age groups will be selected to attend camp at Regina's Wascana Golf Club for one week. The winners in each age group will go on to Vancouver for the Western final.

On the local scene the Manitoba Zone of the CPGA, along with the Manitoba Golf Association and Manitoba Ladies' Golf Association, will be involved with rural clinics and junior and women's development camps.

Our aim is to work toward the development of players who will be able to compete on the national level.

Your local golf professional is also interested, however, in helping every golfer to improve his or her game, and, therefore, his or her enjoyment of the sport, whatever the skill level.

I am positive that we are on the right track toward producing very skilled golf in this country and also toward helping the average golfer reach his or her potential. □

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Sand program can bring new life to tired greens

Back in January, 1980, I started looking into the practice of putting sand on turf greens.

I did this because the greens at the Charleswood Golf Club were always hard and compacted. This was because the greens didn't have a good base. It was mostly a clay loam.

I decided the greens needed a better

base under the turf, so I did a lot of research by reading and talking with people who were using sand for their greens.

The one thing that was pointed out by everyone I talked with was that sand on greens isn't for everyone, but in poor soil conditions, it can be a big plus.

In the spring of 1981, we went on a

sand program at Charleswood. First we did a thorough aerating job on all greens, then spread fine mortar sand on all greens.

We used particle size mostly between .5 and 1 ml., then swept the greens with barn brooms, filling as many holes as possible.

Following this initial treatment, we spread sand on the greens every 10 to 12 days with a cyclone spreader. This puts the sand on at a very low rate, so players on the course are not aware more sand has been applied.

We are still on the sand program at Charleswood and the plus side of the ledger outweighs the minus side by far, such as:

1. We need to aerate only once a year instead of the former three times a year.
2. The greens have a deeper root system.
3. There is better water percolation.
4. The surface is better for the golfers' feet.
5. Good and true putting surfaces are available.
6. There are less compaction problems.

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7. Greens hold the ball much better on approach shots.

8. We have less thatch problems on the greens.

This is only a brief report on why we went on a sand program and the results we obtained at Charleswood. Some of my reasons may also be the reasons other golf course superintendents are on the sand program.

The members of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of Manitoba send best wishes for a good season to all golfers in the province. □

Walter Perchaylo named Superintendent of the Year

Walter Perchaylo of the Pine Ridge Golf Club was named Superintendent of the Year for 1986 at the Golf Course Superintendents Association of Manitoba annual meeting in January.

A past president of the Manitoba association, Perchaylo served as a director for four years and has been a member of the Canadian association for a number of years.

He trained for three years under Doug Drysdale at the Falcon Lake golf

course, 1958-60, and spent five years as superintendent at Pine Falls.

Perchaylo has served at Pine Ridge for 20 years and also at Elmhurst from 1969 to 1974.

His Pine Ridge course was one of two courses used for the 1986 Canadian senior men's championship (along with Elmhurst) and the course also has been the site of the Manitoba Open and other major tournaments in the past. □

Rules and decisions

Every four years, the RCGA, in consultation with the R and A and the USGA, publishes a new Code of Rules. The last Code was published in 1984, so next year a new Code will be published, incorporating all the input from every golf association in the world.

An official Decisions book is published, answering the hundreds of queries made to the various associations.

If you want to test your knowledge of the rules, here are some interesting questions from the Decisions book:

Decision 4-4a/5

Q: A player who started his round with 14 clubs loses his putter. May he replace it during the round?

A: No. A lost club is not one that has become "unfit for play in the normal course of play."

Decision 6-8b/5

The rule regarding when a ball may be cleaned or substituted has been discontinued.

When play has been discontinued under Rule 6-8a, the player may lift and clean his ball or substitute another ball at any time before he addresses the ball, or if he does not address it, before he makes his next stroke at it on the resumption of play.

Decision 13-2/25

Q: There is a bunker between A's ball and the hole. Before playing, A smooths footprints and other irregularities in the bunker on his line of play. Was A in breach of Rule 13-2?

A: Yes. Such action would improve the line of play, contrary to Rule 13-2.

Decision 13-4/20

Q: A takes a rake into a bunker so he can smooth his footprints after playing from the bunker. He sticks the handle of

the rake into the sand prior to playing his stroke. Is this permissible?

A: No. A was in breach of Rule 13-4 which prohibits testing the condition of a hazard when the ball lies in the hazard.

Decision 13-2/13

Q: On the teeing ground, a player broke off a branch which was interfering with his backswing. The player maintained that such action was not a breach of Rule 13-2 because his ball was not yet in play. Was the player correct?

A: No. The player was in breach of Rule 13-2 for improving the area of his intended swing. Although Rule 13-2 allows a player to eliminate irregularities of surface on the teeing ground, it doesn't allow him to break a branch interfering with his swing. The penalty would apply even if the player, before playing his next stroke, re-tee'd elsewhere on the teeing ground.

Decision 13-2/23

Q: A player removes a post defining out-of-bounds on his line of play. He realizes he has made a mistake and replaces it before playing his next stroke. What is the ruling?

A: The player was in breach of Rule 13-2 the moment he moved the post and there was nothing he could do to avoid the penalty. The replacement of the post before the next stroke was irrelevant.

Decision 15-1/5

Q: A player, whose ball was on the putting green, marked his ball and threw it to his caddie for cleaning. The caddie failed to catch the ball and it went into a lake and could not be retrieved. The player holed out with another ball. Was this correct?

A: No. The player holed out with a wrong ball. In match play, the player loses the hole (Rule 15-2). In stroke play, the player is subject to disqualification (Rule 15-3). However, a committee decision could modify the penalty to two strokes.

Decision 17-4/3

Q: A player's ball is resting against the flagstick. Without the player's authority, his opponent or a fellow competitor removes the flagstick and the ball moves away from the hole. What is the ruling?

A: In match play, the opponent incurs a penalty stroke and the ball must be replaced against the flagstick (Rule 18-3b). In stroke play, the ball must be replaced against the flagstick without a penalty (Rule 18-4). In either form of play, the player may then remove the flagstick as prescribed in Rule 17-4.

Decision 18/4

Q: Is a snake an outside agency or a loose impediment?

A: A live snake is an outside agency. A dead snake is a loose impediment.

Decision 20-2a/1-5

Q: A player puts spin on a ball purposely when dropping it. What is the ruling?

A: The player incurs a penalty of one stroke under Rule 20-2a for dropping the ball in an improper manner, unless he corrects his mistake as permitted by Rule 20-6.

Decision 25/4

Q: In a wet area, casual water is not visible before or after the player takes his normal stance. However, by pressing down hard with one foot, the player causes water to appear around the sole of his shoe. Is the player entitled to relief under Rule 25-1b?

A: No. Water visible through undue effort with the feet is not casual water. See definition of "casual water."

Decision 28/3

Q: A player declared his ball unplayable and, under Rule 28b, dropped his ball within two club lengths of the spot where it lay. The ball rolled into another unplayable lie. What is the ruling?

A: The ball is in play when dropped (Rule 20-4). Thus, the player must again invoke the unplayable ball rule, incurring an additional penalty stroke. This assumes the ball did not roll into a position covered by Rule 20-2c, in which case re-dropping without penalty would be required. □

Pine Ridge plans events to mark 75th anniversary

The year was 1912 and a small group of Winnipeg professional and business leaders were on the lookout for a suitable piece of property upon which to build a golf course. The rolling hills and ridges of pine in the Birds Hill area attracted them and it was there that they acquired property and established Pine Ridge Golf Club Inc.

The course was constructed with raw manpower and horse-drawn equipment, chief of which was a slip bucket drawn by six to eight horses.

The course was officially open for play in the summer of 1914. But, then the first World War intervened and plans to construct a clubhouse were put on hold until 1923. Before the clubhouse appeared the members had to get by with a number of tents.

One can hardly imagine what it must have been like to drive to the club with the cars of the era, over primitive roads, then having to seek shelter and satisfy

basic needs in makeshift shelters.

Only the hardy and dedicated golfers would survive such conditions, establishing very early a Pine Ridge tradition, very much alive today, which puts the game and the course somewhat ahead of socializing and clubhouse activities.

It was not until 1923 that a \$4,000 clubhouse was erected, resembling a ranch-style bungalow with a sun porch on two sides. This design, featuring sun and summer breezes, must have had great appeal because a new clubhouse put up in 1962 had a very similar sun porch around two sides, albeit of much larger dimensions than the original.

After 75 years one would expect changes to be made to the clubhouse and the golf course. This has certainly been the case at Pine Ridge.

The original course, designed by the renowned golf course architect, Donald Ross, had a profusion of sand traps. Some of these bunkers have become

obsolete and have been removed and either restored to grass or relocated so that their function served some useful purpose: to penalize a less than adequate shot, or, to save a golfer the indignity of going out of bounds and giving the skilled sand player a sporting chance to atone for his/her error.

If Pine Ridge has a particular group which has given the place beauty and attractiveness it must be the tree planting committee — these are, and have been, members who spent, and still spend, many hours planting pine trees, tending flower beds and erecting Martin houses.

A group of members known affectionately as the T.P.C. (tree-planting committee) established a volunteer tradition which has flourished for decades and is still gratefully appreciated by the members.

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ly spots, trees, shrubs, plants and bird-houses that bear witness to the dedication of this group and its predecessors.

The club committees have removed bunkers, added trees and put in an automatic watering system. But that isn't the end of changes being made — not by a long shot!

A project to solve the drainage problem on the low holes was begun in 1986 and will be completed in Pine Ridge's 75th year. Upon completion this undertaking will change the nature of the course through the addition of three "in play" water hazards in ponds, a "water gate" canal down below, and four new "state-of-the-art" greens in new locations.

Pine Ridgers are excited about the prospect of playing the new holes, which will add esthetic, strategic and competitive dimensions to an already superior golf course.

Those who played the course in the Canadian Amateur of 1965 (won by Bunky Henry in match play against Bill Campbell) and those who participated in the 1986 Canadian Senior Men's Championship would be pleasantly surprised to come back and play the course when the updated irrigation and changes will be functional later this year.

Pine Ridge's present "signature" hole — the ninth (238-yard par-three, all uphill against the prevailing northwest

winds to an inverted-saucer-shaped green) — will hopefully give away this distinction soon to the new 12th hole, or possibly the new eighth, both of which are being changed dramatically.

Pine Ridge members will mark the 75th Anniversary of the club with special events July 1 to 3.

On Canada Day, July 1, there will be a brunch, special ceremonies, a smorgasbord and fireworks. The ladies' section will be active July 2 with all former members invited to play in a tournament to be followed by a special fashion show, featuring 1912 golf fashions. On July 3, there will be a "long" Happy Hour and a dance to celebrate the occasion. □

Cathy Burton outstanding female golf performer in '86

Cathy Burton of Harbour View was the outstanding female performer in Manitoba golf circles in 1986.

The 25-year-old golfer dominated the local competitions, made a good showing in national play, was selected for two international events and was a finalist in the voting for both the Manitoba's Golfer of the Year honors and the Manitoba female athlete of the year award.

Burton topped the City and District championship with scores of 78 at Glendale, 80 at Bel Acres and 76 at Elmhurst for a 54-hole score of 234, 10 shots ahead of her nearest rivals.

Runner-up honors were shared by Merlene Netterfield of Pine Ridge and Lynda Palahniuk of Elmhurst, both with 244. Barb Maslanko of Pine Ridge was next with 246.

In the provincial amateur championship, Burton finished four shots ahead of runner-up Jo-Ann Lindsay of Falcon Beach to win the title, but she was three behind junior champion Aileen Robertson of St. Charles in the three-day competition.

Burton had rounds of 76 at Pine Ridge, 74 at John Blumberg and 82 in the rain at St. Charles for a 54-hole score of 232 to win the title. Lindsay was next with 82-75-79—236, followed by Palahniuk with 84-78-77—239 and Janet Cochrane of St. Charles with 81-79-82—242.

Robertson was the runaway winner of the provincial junior title with scores of 76-73-80—229, a whopping 17 strokes ahead of Kim Brozer of Yorkton, Sask., who shot 80-85-81—246. Another Saskatchewan golfer, Traci Poole of Esterhazy, was next with 249 and Alissa Lauder of Thunder Bay was fourth with 252.

Merlene Netterfield of Pine Ridge captured her third straight provincial senior women's crown with 85-76-86—245, a 23-stroke lead over runners-up Marg Ford of Pine Falls and June Bagley of Southwood, who finished at 257. Ford had 85-83-89, Bagley shot 84-82-91.

In the provincial team trials, Burton was the easy leader for the amateur team with a six-round total of 336. She was joined on the team by Palahniuk with 397, Alison McKinna of St. Charles

with 410 and Cochrane with 414. Cochrane was unable to attend due to school commitments, so Barb Maslanko of Pine Ridge took the fourth team berth.

The provincial junior team was led by Robertson with 389 and she was joined by Lauder with 425 and Rhonda Fleury of Niakwa with 444.

Netterfield paced the trials for the senior team with 413 and was joined by Ford and Bagley, both with 425 and Mary Snyder of Niakwa with 445.

At the national amateur at Saskatoon, Burton carded rounds of 73-76-74-75 for a 72-hole total of 298 and placed sixth, only seven shots behind champion Marilyn O'Connor of Calgary.

Former Manitoba Golfer of the Year and provincial champion Gail Anderson, now playing out of Kelowna, B.C., placed fourth with 295.

Junior champ Robertson tied for 20th with a 72-hole total of 306, Palahniuk had 313 and Maslanko 319.

Burton and Anderson later were joined by Judy Medicott of Calgary as a three-member team for international matches in Australia and Burton and

Anderson formed Canada's team for matches at Cali, Colombia, this spring.

In interprovincial team play, the Manitobans finished tied for third with Alberta at 457, only one stroke behind Ontario, while B.C. had a big lead with 439.

Burton paced the Manitoba team with 76-73, Palahniuk had 78-74, Maslanko 77-79 and McKinna 87-84.

The Manitoba team claimed the low net honors with a total of 435, one better than British Columbia. Maslanko's net scores were 71-73, Burton was 71-74, Palahniuk 75-71 and McKinna 79-76.

At the national junior championship at North Battleford, Sask., Robertson placed ninth with rounds of 79-81-83—243. Jackie Twarmley of Alberta took the honors with 227.

Lauder scored 85-84-89—258, Fleury shot 86-94-84—264 and other Manitobans were Rhona Van Wynsberghe with 266, Shannon Bingham with 272, Robyn Netterfield with 276, Christine Power with 285 and Sheri Poleschuk with 311.

The Manitoba team tied for fifth with Quebec with a total of 329. Alberta won with 310.

The senior women's national play is covered in an article on national senior competitions elsewhere in this issue. □
