MGA provides valuable service to golf

Through club affiliation, approximately 14,000 golfers in Manitoba have a voice in the governing of the MGA. Unpaid officers in this democratic, non-profit organization give generously of their time and talents by attending regular meetings and by serving on committees.

ELIGIBLE CLUBS AND FEES

Any organized golf club in the jurisdiction which has regularly appointed officers is eligible for membership in the association.

Member clubs pay yearly dues to the MGA for each male member 19 years of age and older. Of the membership dues received by the association, \$4.00 per member is forwarded to the RCGA. The MGA provides affiliated clubs with membership and handicap cards for members.

COMPETITIONS

Competitive events involving all player brackets have long been a prominent function of the MGA. From the executive viewpoint they offer an opportunity to display skill at the game, encourage proficiency and provide exchange visits which do much to improve general playing standards.

COURSE RATING AND HANDICAPS

The rating of players by the awarding of handicaps is the balancing factor which allows every golfer to participate on an equal basis. In no other sports have equalizing methods been so successful. The awarding of handicaps has been an important factor in bringing enjoyment to both casual and expert players in competition.

The MGA provides full particulars on the national handicapping system through handicap booklets and charts. All golf courses are similarly rated through the national course rating system. The

MGA provides all member clubs with the official course rating booklet and is responsible for rating golf courses in Manitoba. As a result, all courses and players are rated in relation to a uniform Canadian standard.

RULES AND ETIQUETTE

The present rules of golf represent the accumulated experience of two centuries and were developed out of the play of the game. Golf can only thrive if all players become familiar with the letter of these laws as well as the spirit of the rules code. The MGA provides authoritative and alert administration of all

phases of the association's membership.

PUBLICITY

The news media is supplied with information on all MGA organized competitions and other events of interest to the golfing fraternity. Posters and entry forms are circulated to member clubs in advance of competitions. The MGA also produces an annual *Manitoba Golf Journal* as well as quarterly newsletters.

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

The MGA has a Development Co-ordinator who is responsible for many of the association's programs.

development Co-ordinator is that of organizing special seminars such as Junior Chairman, Rules, etc.

As well, the MGA is involved in administering a Video Library consisting of a variety of instructional tapes which may be borrowed at any time.

MANITOBA SPORTS FEDERATION/PROVINCIAL SPORT DIRECTORATE

The MGA receives financial assistance from the Manitoba Sports Federation through the Manitoba Lotteries. These funds partially cover administration costs and services including office accommodation and related office services in the Administration Centre, as well as a substantial share of the Executive Director and office secretary salaries. The Development Co-ordinator's position and programs are made possible by the Manitoba Sports Federation.

The association also receives an annual grant from the Provincial Sport Directorate to assist in a wide variety of sport programming. The association reports to the department at the season's end on grant expenditures.

MANITOBA GOLF SCHOLARSHIP FUND INC.

The Manitoba Golf Scholarship Fund Inc. is an official charity established to provide periodic scholarships to young male or female golfers who reside in Manitoba.

TURF CONSULTATION

In co-operation with the Golf Course Superintendents Association of Manitoba, a consulting service is available to clubs which may not have a full time superintendent.

Emergency situations which may arise such as disease, fertilization requirements and winter protection may be supported by this program.

phases of golf, a uniform code of Rules of Golf, rules interpretation and distribution of Rules of Golf booklets.

GOLF DEVELOPMENT

A large portion of the MGA's budget is allotted to junior development programs. Through competition, the MGA selects a four man junior team, and with the assistance of the RCGA sponsors them annually in the Canadian Junior Championship. Numerous other competitions at the junior level are also organized by the MGA. Group instruction programs are supported and similar programs carried on at the club level are enthusiastically endorsed by our association.

The MGA is also involved in the development of all phases of the game. The MGA conducts a Golf Conference on a bi-annual basis, which covers all aspects of the game — the player, turfgrass, club management — as well as regular seminars covering topics such as the Rules, Junior Development, and any other topics which may have an ef-

fect on the association's membership. One of the main objectives of the Development Co-ordinator is to promote the game as well as plan and coordinate basic fundamental and rules clinics in rural Manitoba where instruction is not readily available. Available to both juniors and adults, these clinics are arranged through member clubs and regional recreation associations. Clubs which are not members of the MGA receive an initial clinic but are not eligible for further clinics unless they become members of the MGA.

The Development Co-ordinator is also involved in organizing junior camps which include an Elite Camp, Pre-Elite Camp, City Camp and two Rural Camps as well as a Winter program all aimed at helping to develop Manitoba's junior golfers.

To coincide with junior development, the MGA is also planning, designing and coordinating programs to provide golf exposure in the school systems (elementary, junior high, high school and university).

The year 1991 was typically busy for the Manitoba Golf Association, and 1992 is already shaping up to be even busier. The game of golf continues to grow by leaps and bounds across North America and Manitoba is no exception.

What is really exciting is the number of new golf courses which have just opened, or are under development, or are in the planning stage. As well, many of the existing golf courses outside of Winnipeg are undergoing expansion from 9 to 18 holes, or are converting from sand to grass greens. It's all great news for Manitoba golfers!

A recent survey of golf participation in Canada which was carried out by the National Golf Foundation (a U.S. based clearing house for golf information) revealed some startling data. While 18% of Canadians played eight or more rounds of golf in a year (compared to 13% in the States), over 24% of the population of the prairie provinces play the game that often. Obviously these new and expanded courses are needed.

Particularly gratifying is the continued interest and participation by junior age players. Without this growth in the numbers of young players, the future of the game would not be as secure as it is.

GOLF FORUM '92

On March 20 and 21, the MGA held its second biannual conference, called Golf Forum '92. Featuring a variety of topics of interest to all segments of the golf community, the conference brought several national and international speakers to share their knowledge and experience with the delegates. Evaluations received from the participants indicated that Golf Forum '92 was very well-received, and probably ensured that there will be a Golf Forum '94.

Conference Chairman Bob Genoway of Morden (MGA Vice-President for Rural Manitoba) and his committee planned sessions of interest to players of all skill levels, to green superintendents and greens chairmen, and to club managers and board members.

Players learned about the new Slope course rating system; opportunities for golf as a career; and about the mental aspects of the game. Meanwhile, course superintendents and their greens chairmen took in sessions on golf and environmental issues; setting up a maintenance schedule; and buying and maintaining turfgrass equipment. There was also a session on expansion and renovation of courses.

Club management and board members had sessions on junior golf programs, club management, and the resources available to clubs through the Canadian Golf Foundation, the Royal Canadian Golf Association, and the Manitoba Golf Association.

THE PLACE TO SEE THE STARS

For many years, the Manitoba Open has held the reputation of being the premiere event on the Canadian Professional Golf Tour and, in large measure, that reputation has been created because of the wonderful support the tournament has received from the local corporate community. Particularly during somewhat difficult economic times, it is gratifying when a company of the international stature of Xerox Canada Limited makes a commitment to continue, and indeed to expand on its involvement in golf. Their leadership will set a great example for other corporations to follow.

Planning for the '92 event is already underway and the Breezy Bend Host Committee, under the chairmanship this year of Ray Benson, intends that everything will be even better than in 1991. The Canadian Tour grows stronger each year, and attracts many of the finest young professional golfers in the world.

NEW IN '92

The Royal Canadian Golf Association has just announced a new provision under the *Rules of Amateur Status* which should be of interest to golfers wishing to compete in golf tournaments at some distance from their home, but who may find the expenses of doing so a little more than their budget can manage.

Known as the *Five Day Expense Rule*, the new provision allows a player to receive a reasonable amount of expenses which he actually incurs, as follows:

As an individual member nominated or sponsored by his golf club to engage in competition in Canada, provided that the expenses are paid by the golf club and are limited to five (5) competitive days in any one calendar year. "Competitive days" include travelling days and practice days.

The addition of (g) to Rule 1-10 will enable the

individual golfer to receive expenses to participate in an event. Expenses include entry fees, transportation, accommodations and meals.

The club itself is not required to pay expenses. If the members wished to pass the hat, so to speak, this is acceptable provided the club monitors the expenses, as only actual expenses incurred can be reimbursed.

WOMEN'S PROFESSIONAL GOLF AT ITS BEST COMES TO WINNIPEG

The 1992 du Maurier Ltd. Classic is being held at Winnipeg's St. Charles Country Club from August 10 to 16.

The event is the only Canadian stop on the LPGA Tour and is regarded by the players as the most popular tournament on tour. It is one of the LPGA's four major events along with the LPGA Championship, the U.S. Women's Open and the Nabisco Dinah Shore.

Nancy Scranton's win at Vancouver Golf Club last year was achieved in dramatic style: her third round 64 set a women's course record while her last round 68 enabled her to earn a cheque for over \$120,000. The three leading money winners in the du Maurier Ltd. Classic history include:

- LPGA Hall of Fame and three-time winner of the event, Pat Bradley, with \$226,687 (16 appearances)
- Nancy Scranton, \$163,376 (6 appearances)
- Betsy King, \$143,729 (13 appearances)

When you consider that the tournament is also televised nationally and internationally by CTV and RDS (Reseau des Sports) in Canada, Prime Sports Network in the United States, ESPN in Europe, and TBS in Japan, and carries a high television rating, one senses the calibre of entertainment and technique that professionals provide for the viewing gallery and television audience.

Be sure to mark these seven exciting days on your golf calendar.



1992 MANITOBA SUMMER GAMES

After a very successful debut as part of the 1988 Manitoba Summer Games, golf will once again be part of the Games in 1992.

The emphasis of the golf competition in the Summer Games program is that golf is truly a

"lifetime" sport. Of 11 sports in the '92 Summer Games, golf is the only one which is open to every age group and to both males and females. The age classifications will be: 10-13, 14-17, 18-34, 35-54, 55-64 and 65 and over.

Each of the seven regions in the province will be conducting a regional golf competition where the winner of each age category listed above (both male and female) will go on to represent his/her region at the Manitoba Summer Games finals in Minnedosa and Neepawa from August 19-23, 1992. Listed below are the dates, locations and contact phone numbers for each regional competition.

An official handicap is not required to participate in

the regional golf competitions. Golfers who have competed in the following events since 1988 will not be eligible to compete in the 1992 Games:

 - Those players qualifying for the final 36 holes in Manitoba Junior

Ready for the challenge!

WHEN MGA EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR JEFF HNATIUK ANNOUNCED HIS INTENTION TO JOIN THE MANITOBA AMATEUR HOCKEY ASSOCIATION LAST SPRING, THE SEARCH WAS ON FOR A SUITABLE REPLACEMENT. ENTER DON CRAIG.

After guiding the activities of the highly successful Winnipeg World Curling Championships, then serving as President of the newly established Manitoba Open Inc., Craig was ready to meet the challenge of guiding the MGA into the '90s. In the following interview, the congenial Mr. Craig shares his thoughts on the Manitoba Golf Association — past, present and future:

How did you get interested in golf?

"I started working with the City of Winnipeg at the age of 15 when I got a summer job working at the Kildonan Park Golf Course. I got involved in golf, coincidentally and accidentally. I worked summers for seven years, through high school and university. I never did get a university degree because I was too busy having a good time. Then, I was offered a clerical position with the City and I accepted."

And you worked your way up through the system from there?

"I guess I went from the lowest position in the entry level to the second most senior position in Parks and Recreation in the city. Mind you, it took 36 years. I spent the last eight years with the city as Director of Recreation and Community Parks."

Though you started working around golf, is it true you weren't particularly interested in the sport at that time?

"When I started with the City, I was not a

golfer. The Polo Park Golf Course was virtually in my back yard then and the only time I'd set foot on the golf course was to collect stray golf balls out of Omand's Creek to sell back to golfers."

As you worked around the sport, it seems your interest in golf grew. How did that interest manifest itself?

"I decided to become a golf volunteer so I joined the MGA and served as representative of city courses on its Board of Directors. I also joined the Manitoba Golf Course Superintendents Association, a membership I maintained until my retirement from the city and one which I intend to renew. At the MGA, I served in all chairmanship positions including president (1977) ... I've been involved in golf as a volunteer administrator provincially and at the national level since about 1965."

What was your involvement at the national level?

"I was invited in 1981 to become a member of the Board of Governors of the Royal Canadian Golf Association. I've served 10 years as a volunteer in that organization. In 1991, I was elected Honourary Governor which is very nice but it's virtually automatic for anyone who hangs around for 10 years."

Everyone dreams of retiring early and you were able to do that. What prompted your decision?

"I retired at the age of 51. For pension purposes, continuing to work didn't have as many advantages due to my years of service. Also, my job wasn't as satisfying as it once had been. It's one of life's ironies that, as you rise in an organization, each step you take up takes you one step further away from the things that really attracted you or

interested you most in the first place. I have no regrets. Had this (MGA) not come along, I would still have no regrets. The decision was not one made in haste, by any stretch of the imagination. It was simply time for a change."

Why were you interested in the Executive Director position with MGA?

"When I left the city, I had nothing specific in mind though I always knew I would like to do something in golf because my duties with Parks & Recreation, and as a

golf volunteer and golf administrator, were all wrapped up in golf. When I retired, if I had thought about my choice of any position out there, I don't think I could have wished for anything better than this. It gave me an opportunity to get involved in something I knew I enjoyed doing. For me, it was a perfect fit."

What is involved in the Executive Directorship of MGA?

"The Executive Director oversees the day-to-day management of the Manitoba Golf Association; looks after its financial interests; liaises with member clubs; and maintains supplies. Maybe, most importantly, our role at the MGA office is to provide the necessary resources for the volunteers, who make up the MGA, to carry out their responsibilities. They are the MGA. The administration is the support or the resource to the volunteers."

I understand you are also President of Manitoba Open Inc. Why was this organization formed and what is your role?

"Manitoba Open Inc. is a separate (from MGA) company created exclusively to plan, organize and conduct the Manitoba Open. MGA was looking for someone with experience in the conduct of major championships, including professionals, and in the administrative aspect. The MGA Executive came to me and asked me to be the President of this company."

"The company's Board consists of two MGA appointees, two from the host club which is Breezy Bend, representatives from the four major sponsors and another person to act as President. The President chairs meetings, performs administrative work, prepares budgets, solicits and liaises with sponsors, maintains supplies, conducts billings, etc."

"One of the biggest responsibilities, if not the biggest, is what I call the 'recruitment, care and feeding' of our corporate sponsors. Without the corporate support that we enjoy uniquely here in Manitoba for the Open, there wouldn't be an Open. It's that simple."

What do you think is the most important consideration in dealing with corporate sponsors?

"There are about 120 companies who contribute to the Open in varying degrees from financial support to the

donation of products and services. An important aspect of that is to ensure these companies are receiving a fair return on their investment. I think, too often, volunteer organizations think the corporate community is out there as an endless supply of funds. Companies are not philanthropic. That is not why they were created; to donate money to causes, no matter how worthy those causes might be. So, we have to try to find ways that we can mutually achieve what we're looking for."

What do you consider to be the greatest strength you bring to your position with the MGA?

"When I worked for the city, I always considered myself to be a bureaucrat because I never considered it to be a negative term. I'm a professional administrator. I am what you would call a 'generic manager' as opposed to a specialist. I have experience in many areas."

What do you think is the greatest challenge facing the MGA in the 1992 season?

"I think we need to make our membership aware of why there needs to be a Manitoba Golf Association. What does this organization do for you, as a member of a club, or as one who golfs occasionally? What do you get out of your \$9 per year plus GST?"

How do you expect the Board and yourself will address that challenge?

"Vice President Bob Genoway of Morden and I have talked about the MGA initiating an information program to educate people about the association and its function in representing the best interests of golfers, from the elite to those at the grassroots level. We will likely start by reviewing our informational materials and update where necessary."

The MGA also acts as a lobby group for the golfing community. What kind of projects has it taken on?

"We have taken an active stance in establishing 'favourable treatment' for golf courses in relation to increasing property taxes. We were not looking for an exemption; just favourable treatment considering the contributions made by golf courses to our quality of life."

What are your short- and long-term goals with the MGA?

"My immediate goal is to fully familiarize myself with the operation of the MGA, our relationship to the Manitoba Sports Federation, volunteers' expectations of the organization, and to master the laptop computer. Over the long-term, I will be working to improve the MGA's profile."

What were the highlights of the 1991 Manitoba golf season and how do they reflect on the MGA's progress?

"Our Junior team won the Canadian championship and three of the four team members are still of juvenile age with two more years of eligibility. It is great for them and kudos for the MGA. I think it points out that our junior development program is working. I was at the Canadian Junior Championship (in a RCGA capacity) and people from other provincial jurisdictions were saying 'what are you people in Manitoba doing to be developing this calibre of player — and so many of them — out of a relatively small population base?'"

"Our Willingdon Cup team tied for first and lost in the playoff in Ottawa with another fairly young team. Todd Fanning was named Labatt Manitoba Golfer of the Year and was selected to play on an international team representing Canada in a competition in Australia and did very well there."

"It has to be gratifying for the people who have been working with the players and have seen them coming along, advancing to this level, knowing they have contributed in some way to their success. These players obviously have a lot of talent to start with but they still need the opportunities and the events in which to participate so they can develop those talents."

What significant rule changes can golfers expect in the 1992 season?

"The changes to the code in 1992 are relatively minimal. They are more cosmetic changes to clarify the rules."

"However, 1992 will see Canada, through the RCGA, adopt the 'slope' system for course rating handicaps. Through '92 and probably into '93, golf courses across Canada, including those of the MGA, will be re-rated under the new slope system which is designed to eliminate the home course advantage that some players have."

Todd Fanning named Manitoba's best

TWELVE YEARS AGO, A PROMISING YOUNG GOLFER LEFT THUNDER BAY TO MAKE HIS HOME IN WINNIPEG. TODAY IT IS INCREASINGLY OBVIOUS THAT ONTARIO'S LOSS WAS MANITOBA'S GAIN.

Southwood's Todd Fanning first swung a golf club at the tender age of five, following the lead of his father who was an avid golfer.

"It's the same old story," Fanning laughs. "I had the old cut-down wooden driver and when my father played golf, I walked around and hit balls while he was playing."

Fanning began his competitive career after relocating to Manitoba and credits the direction and competition he received at Southwood for his steady skill development.

"The junior program at Southwood, where I'm a member, is really good," says Fanning. "I was fortunate enough to have a lot of good players my age to play against and I just kept going from there."

And going and going ...

After another illustrious season which saw him capture

his third Amateur title, Fanning was named Labatt Manitoba Golfer of the Year for 1991. Sharing the nominee spotlight were Rob McMillan, Aileen Robertson and Christy Power. Fanning says the announcement was a definite surprise.

"I thought the candidates I was up against had done as much as I had. They were all provincial champions who had done well nationally, so it was a real surprise," says Fanning. "I guess I did have a good year."

Indeed it was a very good year. Named Golfer of the Year for a fourth time, Fanning followed his victory at the Manitoba Amateur by being the low Manitoban at the Canadian Championship. He was selected to represent Canada on a four-man team at the Pacific Team Championship in Perth, Australia based on, he believes, his past performances at the Canadian Junior Championships and his consistent good play within Manitoba. Fanning's feats were further recognized with his selection as finalist for the Manitoba Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association 1991 Male Athlete of the Year.

Considering the experience "Downunder" to be a definite highlight of his golf year, Fanning also had the opportunity to show his stuff in a very challenging setting as tournament organizers invited the Canadian team members to participate as individuals in the Australian Amateur. The tenacious Fanning advanced to quarter-final play in the match play tournament before being eliminated. He says the experience was an enlightening one.

"It was quite an eye-opener to see some of the better young players in Australia," says Fanning. "Three of the four guys on their team were 20 and 21 years old and these guys were breaking course records. They were just incredible. They're playing 12 months of the year. You really get an understanding of how good you have to be to make a living at this sport."

And making a living at the sport is just what Fanning intends to do but he's approaching the jump to the pros with caution.

"I thought briefly last summer about turning pro in the fall," says Fanning. "After playing with some people who had tried to turn pro, I decided to wait until I could make a living at it rather than going out there just because I've nothing better to do and struggle along. I've given myself

another couple of years as an amateur before I decide to turn pro."

Fanning says he'd like to follow the career route taken by fellow Manitoban Glen Hnatiuk who's currently playing on the Ben Hogan Tour. The approximately 30 tournaments per year on the Hogan Tour appeals to Fanning who says his professional timelines are flexible.

"If, in two years, I don't feel ready for it, I'm not going to do it just because I said I would," says a reflective Fanning. "I've got to make sure I'm ready to win some money and that means practicing hard ... It's time to start showing I'm worthy of attaining professional status."

It is that sort of vision and determination that leads people to success but golf was not the only professional sport that beckoned Fanning's athletic prowess. The National Hockey League's Vancouver Canucks drafted Fanning in 1987 after a successful goaltending career at Ohio State where he earned a business degree on a hockey/golf scholarship. Graduating in 1990, he tested the NHL waters but opted for a more gentlemanly pursuit.

"I tried to pursue my hockey career so I attended Vancouver Canucks' training camp in 1990," says Fanning. "I kicked it around a bit and decided I didn't want to live a life in the minors. I thought I do have a degree and I do

have some sort of golf skills' so I think I want to pursue those rather than playing minor professional hockey for the next four or five years."

His concentration on hockey turned his attention away from his golf game; a consequence Fanning hoped to resolve as one of his goals for the '91 season.

"One of my goals for last year was to get back to the level where I was as a junior and, to do that, I just needed to practice a lot more," Fanning says. "Of course, I wanted to repeat as Amateur champion and I did that. I wanted to play in more events and I did that by going to North Dakota four times. You can practice as much as you want but you've got to be playing competitively more often. That's what I did and I was fairly successful down there."

This season, Fanning is striving to be a member of the four-player team representing Canada in the World Amateur Championship held every two years. The 1992 edition takes place in Vancouver in September but further challenges lie in Fanning's path before he may get the opportunity to ascend the world stage.

"I'd like to win the Manitoba Amateur again," says Fanning, admiring the idea of three in a row. "I would also like to play in the Manitoba Open and I have a goal of being eight-under-par or better over four rounds so that's an average of 70 at Breezy Bend. You try to set goals that are very hard to reach. In golf, you've got to aim high, shoot low."

Fanning credits an early start to his success in the game though talent and perseverance have not hurt him any, either. He readily acknowledges the support shown by his mother and stepfather who have encouraged him throughout his university life and golf career. He chuckles while noting his mother "was at every round of every tournament in the province last year. I think she enjoys it."

Another person who has been a significant influence on Fanning is a champion himself, Manitoba Sports Hall of Famer, Allan Boes.

"When I won my first Amateur at 16 years of age, he was so excited, he gave me one of his medals that they used to give instead of trophies," says Fanning of his long-time friend. "He gave me one of his medals from 1940. Every year, going into the last round, I put on his medal for a little inspiration."

The affable Fanning has made many friends in his career, among them Gary Nicklaus whose golfing father was a boyhood favourite of Fanning's. "Yeah, I've met Jack Nicklaus a few times," says Fanning, with a laugh. "Actually, the clubs I use are a spare set of Jack's. His son asked me to try them out and, if I liked them, I could have them. Of course, I did."

But it is not the "famous" clubs that are the most memorable aspect of this talented 24-year-old's performance on the links. His ready smile and easy-going nature have made him a fan favourite at tournaments around the province. For Todd Fanning, the future seems filled with the sort of challenges on which his competitive spirit thrives.

Fanning's TIP


"I've always prided myself on being a good putter," says 1991 Manitoba Amateur champion, Todd Fanning.

"Sometimes what separated me from a few of the others was my ability to putt better than most."

According to Fanning, proper head position is one of the more critical aspects of successful putting.

"The key to putting is to keep your eyes over top of the ball. Don't get your head behind it. If you were to drop a ball off the end of your nose, it should land on top of the ball you're putting. It keeps everything square through the putting stroke. It's such a small movement but so important.

"Keeping your head still in putting may be more important than keeping your head still during the swing."

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Fanning becomes only second repeat winner

THE MANITOBA AMATEUR CROWN ALMOST SLIPPED THROUGH HIS FINGERS IN 1990 BUT SOUTHWOOD'S TODD FANNING WAS DETERMINED NOT TO LET HISTORY REPEAT ITSELF.

"THIS YEAR'S EVENT WASN'T AS CLOSE AS IT'S BEEN IN OTHER YEARS," SAYS FANNING. "IN 1990, I ALMOST LET IT (THE CHAMPIONSHIP) SLIP AWAY. I HAD A BIG LEAD, LOST IT, THEN MANAGED TO GET IT BACK. I WASN'T GOING TO LET THAT HAPPEN THIS YEAR."



After a narrow victory in 1990, Todd earned the 1991 title by a convincing 10 strokes.

And the perennial fan favourite was true to his word; it just took him a while to get started. Fanning assumed the lead after 36 holes and never looked back enroute to his second consecutive Manitoba Amateur Golf Championship, played July 16-19 at the Rossmere Golf and Country Club.

QUALIFYING ROUND ACTION

The challenges came not only from the golf course but from nature and technology as 144 golfers vied for 88 spots in the Amateur qualifier at the Glendale Golf and Country Club.

Scorching heat, pesky mosquitoes and unexpected sprinkler action were among the obstacles to be overcome by competitors before a playoff that gave new meaning to the term 'twilight golfing.'

On the first extra hole, the automatic sprinkler system inadvertently became functional just as Ron Smith was getting ready to putt. The putt was rained out as Smith's companions did their best to avoid getting drenched.

When it was finally over, 88 competitors were ready to join the 56 exempt players for the Manulife Manitoba Amateur Championship.

Top qualifiers included Michael Walker of Charleswood (even-par 72), Niakwa's Doug Irwin (73), Karl Parrington of Kenora (73), Scott Parker of Rossmere (74), Trent Wood of Southwood (74), Len Sovak of Pine Ridge (74), and Andrew Taylor of Rossmere at 75.

ROUND ONE

Al Briscoe of St. Boniface was the unexpected leader after recording a two-under-par 68 in first round action.

Rossmere's Gary Kullman, who captured low amateur honours at the Manitoba Open days previous, followed that feat with a one-under 69 on his home course, good for second place.

Two back of Kullman, tied at one-over 71 were Southwood's Todd Fanning, Glendale's Jeff Helper, Grant Foster of Niakwa and Darren McMillan of Pine Ridge.

ROUND TWO

Reigning champ Todd Fanning reverted to his old form, fashioning a four-under-par 66 to open a six-shot lead at 137 after 36 holes.

Todd Teplitski of Pine Ridge shot a 69 while Rich Sobkovich of Rossmere recorded a 70 to leave the pair in a tie at three-over 143. Another shot back were Garth Collings of Breezy Bend and Rossmere's Gary Kullman.

Fanning says he put his golf career on hold during his years at Ohio State University at Columbus as he pursued another in professional hockey. His time away from practice took its toll on his game but he showed he still has the right stuff with birdies on 2, 8, 10, 12, 13 and 16 enroute to his second round lead.

First round leader Al Briscoe of St. Boniface dropped to 14-back (68-83=151), dispelling his hopes of an upset victory. Meanwhile, Gary Kullman, the Open's low amateur, scored a disappointing 75 for a two-round total of 144.

ROUND THREE

Todd Fanning completed third round action with a one-over 71, appearing well-poised to capture his second consecutive Amateur crown. His 54-hole total of two-under 208 left him eight strokes up on his nearest competitor.

Carman's Bruce North was alone in second place with a three-round total of 216 while Breezy Bend's Dale Goehring and Garth Collings tied for third at 217.

Shooting themselves out of contention were Todd Teplitski of Pine Ridge (74-69-76=219) and Rossmere's Rich Sobkovich (73-70-81=224).

Match Play champ Dave Lavallee of Pine Ridge was tied at 218 with Junior champion Rob McMillan (77-71-70=218).

First round leader Al Briscoe (68-83-71=222) followed, one stroke ahead of Andrew Taylor of Rossmere (75-73-71=219).

FINAL ROUND PLAY

Todd Fanning became only the second golfer since Elmhurst's Billy Parker (1978, 1979) to win consecutive Manitoba Amateur Championships by coasting to an even-par 280 in final round action at Rossmere.

Fanning finished up with a two-over 72, 10 shots better than Dave Lavallee (77-70-71-72=290) and Niakwa's Doug Irwin (73-73-77-67=290).

"I concentrated more on not playing the people behind me but playing the course and that really helped," said a victorious Fanning. "If someone's going to shoot the scores to beat me, then they've played well. But when you've got the lead, they've got to catch you."

And no one did.

Bruce North of Carman, who started the final round in sole possession of second place, came up with a 75 for a 291 total and a share of fourth with Breezy Bend's Dale Goehring and Garth Collings. Rossmere's Rob Loewen recorded a second consecutive 71 to finish in seventh place.

Twenty-two golfers with scores of 299 or better qualified for the Willingdon Cup team trials held July 27-28 at Pine Ridge.

Willingdon Cup Trials

Todd Fanning's commanding lead going into Willingdon Cup play at Rossmere made the 36-hole contest a pleasure trip as he shot a one-over 73 to increase his overall lead to 12 strokes. His five-round total of 353 was never threatened though the other three spots on the Manitoba team were still very much up for grabs.

Tied for second at 365 were Dale Goehring of Breezy Bend (74) and Doug Irwin of Niakwa (75).

At 367 in the fourth and final position was Dave Lavallee of Pine Ridge (77), one up on clubmate Todd Teplitski who, along with Brandon's Grant Coulter, recorded the day's best score of 72.

THE FEARSOME FOURSOME ARE DECLARED

It was Todd Fanning all the way as he waltzed to a 14-stroke victory in the final round of the Willingdon Cup team trials at Rossmere.

Fanning's final round 70 added to his six-round total of 423 and one-under-par win.

His closest rival was Dale Goehring of Breezy Bend whose closing round of 70 gave him a 435 total.

The third team spot was captured by Match Play champ Dave Lavallee of Pine Ridge who persevered to a 71 and a 438 total.

The battle for the fourth and final position was a cliffhanger as Todd Teplitski of Pine Ridge and Doug Irwin of Niakwa, both at 441, fought it out in a playoff with Irwin emerging victorious. Irwin's birdie on the first playoff hole ensured his spot on Manitoba's Willingdon Cup squad.

Teplitski was named the team's first alternate and a Manitoba representative at the Manitoba-Minnesota matches slated for mid-August in St. Paul, Minnesota. His teammates included Carman's Bruce North, Garth Collings of Breezy Bend and Grant Coulter of Brandon.

Fanning earned his fifth trip to the Canadian Amateur to be played at the Royal Ottawa Golf Club in Aylmer, Quebec from August 21-24. For Goehring, Lavallee and Irwin, it was a novice experience.

The Canadian Championship

A golfer used to rounds of a different kind was the leader after 18 holes of the Canadian Amateur Golf Championship at Aylmer, Quebec.

Lucas Parsons, a part-time bartender in his native Australia, bagged a three-under-par 68 in intermittent drizzle to lead the pack after the first round of play.

Manitoba's Todd Fanning was alone in second place at 69, the result of his sixth consecutive sub-par round.

Fanning was right in the thick of things after second round play, shooting a two-over 73, three strokes back of the leader with a 36-hole total of 142. Scores are determined through the top three rounds from each team over 36 holes.

Manitoba finished play tied with Quebec but La Belle Province claimed the crown by a single stroke on the second hold of a sudden-death playoff. Todd Fanning was the low Manitoban as teammates Dale Goehring, Doug Irwin and Dave Lavallee represented their province well at the national level.

Gibson sets course record

THE MANITOBA OPEN LOOKED LIKE A ONE-MAN SHOW UNTIL THE HALFWAY POINT. THEN, ANOTHER PERFORMER WORKED HIS WAY INTO THE SPOTLIGHT TO EARN THE FINAL OVATION.

New Orleans 5th-year pro Kelly Gibson tore up Breezy Bend, the new home of Manitoba's premiere golf event, enroute to a blistering 21-under-par tournament record and the \$18,000 championship prize. Gibson, who earlier in the week entertained patrons of a West Winnipeg bar with his karaoke skills, shaved four strokes off the record set by 1990 champion Jeff Bloom.

Overcoming a commanding lead built up by 1989 Open champ Stuart Hendley over the first two rounds, Gibson grabbed the lead after 54 holes and never looked back.

Undaunted by a strong south wind in final round play, Gibson fashioned a 6-under-par 66 for a 72-hole total of 261. He finished four strokes up on Hendley whose final round 3-under

69 completed his 271 total.

Hendley, of Woodlands, Texas, earned \$10,000 for his efforts along with an extra \$500 for recording the best single round of the tournament with his record 10-under-par 62 on opening day.

Florida's Todd Hamilton bagged the best score of the final round with an 8-under-par 64 for a 72-hole total of 274, good for third place honours and \$6,000.

With the exception of two holes, Gibson was alone in the lead. He parred the first hole while Heinen, Brown and Hendley each birdied to create a four-way tie for top spot at 15-under-par.

Gibson birdied the second hole as did Hendley and Heinen, while Brown's bogey saw him lose ground on the leaders.

The eventual winner made his move with a birdie on the third hole followed by five more on the 4th, 6th, 8th, 11th and 15th.

Ian Leggatt of Cambridge shot a final round 69, moving him into a fourth place tie with Heinen. The two each collected \$4,500.

Local favourite, former Manitoban Glen Hnatiuk took home \$2,250 after finishing in a five-way tie for 8th place. His closing round 71 brought his 72-hole total to 277, 11-under-par.

Manitoba's contribution to the PGA Tour, Dan Halldorson carded a one-over-par 73 in final round action to close in a tie for 23rd place at 281.

Low Amateur honours were captured by three-time Manitoba Amateur winner Gary Kullman of Rossmore but the field was too

Human interest stories were the order of the day during Open qualifying round action at Bel Acres Country Club as a honeymooning pro and a father-son combination were among those earning the final eight berths.

Mike Heinen Jr. of Louisiana recruited his bride of three weeks to handle caddy chores as he carded a one-under-par 71 to share top spot with Illinois pro Marty DeAngelo.

John Irwin, head pro at Niakwa, shot a one-over-par 73 to qualify and shared the experience with his son, Doug whose 74 made him the only amateur player to qualify.

SHOOT-OUT SHOWDOWN

It starts with seven and then there's one. The Annual Shoot-out features seven players beginning play on the first hole with one player eliminated per hole. Started in 1990, this event has become a popular prelude to the Manitoba Open.

Windsor pro and 1986 Open champion, Bob Panasik collected \$1,100 for a day's work after surviving two shootouts enroute to the \$900 first prize and added another \$200 for a pair of birdies.

Burnaby's Ward Stouffer claimed second place — good for \$600 — and added \$200 in birdie bonuses.

Dan Halldorson also made it

through two shootouts before being eliminated by Panasik on the second-last hole. Halldorson earned \$500 for his trouble matched by Guy Boros of Fort Lauderdale who combined his \$100 birdie bonus with his \$400 prize.

Jovial Jack Kay Jr. of Toronto, the third eliminated, picked up \$300 and Canadian Tour member Rick Todd bowed out second, earning a \$200 prize and a birdie bonus.

Jeff Bloom of Seattle, 1990 Manitoba Open champ, bid a hasty exit with a bogey on the first hole but still managed to collect a \$100 prize.

THE PRO-JUNIOR EVENT

Six professionals teamed up with rural, city and Breezy Bend junior members in a nine-hole team tournament as Quebec pro Remi Bouchard led his team to top honours in the pro-junior event also played July 10 at Breezy Bend. Bouchard's three-under-par 33 combined with John Hopfner of Dauphin (34), John Stroich of Rossmere (38) and Dan Caron of the Bend at 40 for an aggregate score of 123 over nine holes.

Low pro honours belonged to Jeff Buder of Ontario with a 32 and his team of Joel Cure of Rat River, Kurt Gerecke of the host club and Jason Terris of Bel Acres took second place with an aggregate score of 126.

THE PRO-AM EVENT

Lee Porter of North Carolina established a competitive course record with a bogey-free, eight-under-par 64 to set the pace in the Manitoba Open Pro-Am Tourney played July 10 at Breezy Bend. Thirty-eight teams took part in the competition, each consisting of two pros and three amateurs.

Porter, who birdied four holes on each nine,

earned \$500 as the tournament's low individual score.

One stroke back was Jim Reist of Rogersville, Alabama, David Tentsis of White Bear Lake, Minnesota and Ashley Chinner of Toronto.

Pro-Am team honours went to pros Joe Lloyd and Vic Wilk with help from their amateur team mates Butch Barkwell, John Crandell and Len Baranyk with a total of 217 points. Each pro earned \$300.

Second place belonged to the team of pros Mike Grob and Ron Philo and amateurs Bill Morrissey, Scott Grant and Pat Newbound with \$200 in prizes going to each of the professionals.

Third, at 211, were pros David Tentsis and Pat Kemball along with amateurs Scott Edgar, Jim Scollan and Al Shipman, with \$100 prizes going to each professional.

THE GRAND FINALE

On July 11, the Manitoba Open began amid the surroundings of its home for the next three years, the Breezy Bend Golf and Country Club.

Those who predicted high scores looked sheepish as 1989 Open champ Stuart Hendley shot a course record 10-under-par 62 to take the lead after first round action.

Rainy weather contributed to more than half of the 156 competitors bettering par, with another 10 at even par. Showers dogged play-

ers most of the day, letting up only for the final hour of competition.

Fours shots back of the leader were Phillip Hatchett of Kentucky and Louisiana's Mike Heinen who fended off the morning rain to record 6-under-par 66s.

After the first round, Gary Kullman of Rossmere was the leading amateur and the low Manitoban with his two-under-par 70. Challenging Kullman were Todd Fanning of Southwood, Bruce North of Carman and Dale Goehring of the host club, each at 71. Other notable Manitobans included Carl Lechman of Elmhurst (72), 1991 Match Play champion Dave Lavallee of Pine Ridge (73) and Doug Irwin of Niakwa at 73.

Setting the pace for local pros were Carman's Pat Kemball, Brandon's Tom Relf and Teulon's Barry Gibson each of whom carded a 71. Pat O'Donnell of Pine Ridge (72) was one stroke ahead of Jim Lazarko of Pine Falls, John Irwin of Niakwa, John Bowen of Blumberg, and Michel Pion of Harbour View, all at 73.

ROUND TWO

Mother Nature was in fine form during second round play as winds and heavy rain took centre stage resulting in a 2 1/2 hour rain delay.

When play finally resumed, Stuart Hendley padded his lead by carding a 6-under-par 66 for a two-day total of 128, 16-under-par.

Hendley's 66 was matched by Mark Wurtz of Washington, Louis Brown of Georgia and Marty Schiene of Illinois as best scores in the second round.

Dale Goehring of Breezy Bend, 1990 Junior champ, recorded a 5-under-par 67 to go along with his one-under 71 after 18 to bring his total to 138, 10 shots back of the leader.

The flurry of low scores over 36 holes made the cut-off mark a stingy one but 72 players made the grade with scores of two-under-par 142 or better to advance to the final two rounds.

ROUND THREE

At last, golf weather! On a windless, sun-filled day, the plot thickened when third round action saw Kelly Gibson, a 5th year pro from New Orleans, take over the lead with a blistering nine-under-par 63. His three-round total of 201 was 15-under-par.

Gibson's feat was one stroke back of Stuart Hendley's record-setting first round performance. Ironically, the leader through the first two rounds recorded the fifth worst score of the third.

Hendley saw his sizeable lead diminished as he scored a two-over 74 to drop to 14-under-par with a 54-hole total of 202. Louis Brown of Georgia (66) and Louisiana's Mike Heinen Jr. (67) made progress to join Hendley at 14-under-par.

Manitoba's PGA Tour star, Dan Halldorson recorded a third round 69 for an eight-under-par total of 208 and Carman's Pat Kemball, the only active Manitoban to survive the cut, shot a 70 for a seven-under 209.

Competition was intense in the top amateur honours race as Dale Goehring boasted a four-shot lead coming into third round action. The 1990 Amateur champ had some difficulty and, after a third round score of 77, found himself tied with Carman's Bruce North, Todd Fanning of Southwood and Illinois pro Marty DeAngelo.

The Re/Max Real Estate Long Drive competition was a close contest as Cam Emerson of Grimsby, Ontario belted a 322-yard drive off the first tee at Breezy Bend to win the competition, postponed from July 13 due to rain. Emerson, a Canadian Tour member who also holds a Hogan card, finished three yards ahead of Kelly Murray, well-known for his enthusiastic drives.

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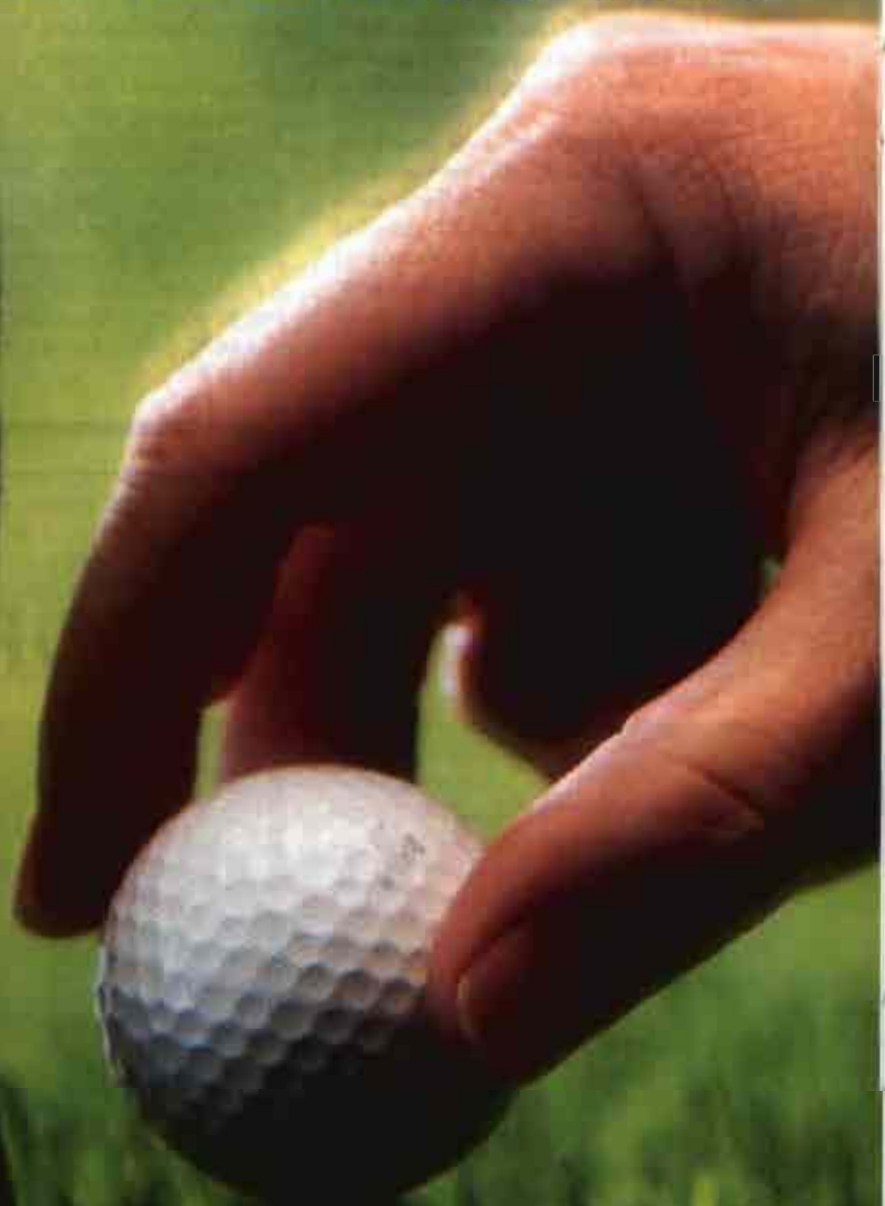
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Convincing win for McMillan

THE RAIN, IT'S PLAIN, FELL MAINLY ON THE 1991 MANITOBA JUNIOR GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP, PLAYED JULY 2 TO 5 AT THE ST. CHARLES GOLF AND COUNTRY CLUB AND JOHN BLUMBERG GOLF COURSE.

TORRENTIAL RAIN FORCED THE CANCELLATION OF SECOND ROUND PLAY RENDERING THE TOURNAMENT A 54-HOLE CONTEST.

Tournament favourite Rob McMillan of Pine Ridge, didn't disappoint as he put together three solid efforts to produce a winning total of 212, three-under-par and 12 strokes better than his closest competition.

McMillan, who lost the 1990 event in the last round, seemed determined to redeem himself and succeeded brilliantly.

"Last year, when I lost it on the last day, it became a big goal for me to win this year," said McMillan. "I still remember the feeling of losing so it was a huge win for me."

FIRST ROUND ACTION

McMillan completed the first round of play with a blazing 5-under-par 67 at St. Charles, five strokes ahead of Tyler Rice of Wasagaming and Andy Oakden of Brandon Wheat City who carded even-par 72s on the day. Another shot back was Derron Magda of Elmhurst at 73.

McMillan started slowly, matching par on the par-5 first hole followed by a bogey on the second challenge. But that bogey would be his last of the round, replaced instead by a succession of birdies on 5, 6, 9, 10, 13 and 14.

Meanwhile, Marc Cadieux and Scott Brown covered their home course in 74 strokes. Five players tied at 76 including Craig Ash of Brandon, Elmhurst's Jeff Lailey, Melita's Jason Hicks, Brian Houston of Niakwa and Jeff Cieccko of Southwood. The lowest tally of the day at Blumberg was 79, shot by Kenora's Ron Johnson.

AFTER 36 HOLES

The field of 158 traded courses for second round action and McMillan continued his domination of the tourney at the par-71 John Blumberg course.

McMillan bagged a one-under 70 for a cumulative total of six-under-par 137, prompting many to speculate the Pine Ridge golfer might challenge the Junior-title-by-18-strokes record set by 1987 champ, Jeff Helper. The rain-inspired cancellation of second round play dashed that theory but failed to dampen McMillan's enthusiasm. His closest rivals were Tyler Rice of Wasagaming (72-73=145) and Andy Oakden of

Brandon Wheat City (72-74=146).

Jeff Ciecko of Southwood (76-73=149) was in fourth after 36 holes, followed by Elmhurst's Jeff Lailey at 150 and Derron Magda of Elmhurst, Scott Brown and Marc Cadieux of St. Charles, Brian Houston of Niakwa and Jody Chudley of Brandon, all tied at 151.

While scores better than 166 made the cut going into final round play, the 16 best scores after 18 holes also qualified for another 36-hole contest to determine the four-player provincial team.

Younger age group winners were determined through play on the 36 holes. Thirteen-year-old David Francis of Kenora topped the 13-14 age group with a two-round total of 160, four strokes better than Daniel Chartrand of Southwood at 164.

The 12-and-under shield went to Adam Speirs of St. Charles whose 93-85=178 bettered the 88-93=181 recorded by Russell's Ryan Robson of Russell.

NEVER IN DOUBT

The prolific McMillan carded a final round three-over-par 75 but still increased his lead, taking the Junior title with a 54-hole total of 212, three-under-par and 12 strokes better than runner-up, Derron Magda of Elmhurst.

"It was very satisfying," said McMillan of his victory. "Especially because there was no question of winning. It wasn't close; it was not a fluke. I kind of made it a win

instead of ekeing it out."

Magda sneaked into a second place finish by recording the best score of the day — a one-over 73 — to close out at 224, one up on Wasagaming's Tyler Rice (72-73-80=225).

McMillan's victory also cinched the 15-16 age group shield while Magda, once again, settled for runner-up honours. The toast of the 17-18 age category was Tyler Rice whose 225 was two strokes better than Dean North of Carman (78-74-75=227).

The provincial juvenile team was chosen for the Western Canada Juvenile Team Championship for golfers 16 years of years of age or under, slated for the St. Boniface Golf Club. Joining McMillan and Magda in the winner's circle were Niakwa clubmates Brian Houston and Todd Slatnik.

Junior Team Trials

Rob McMillan followed his victory in the Manitoba Junior by cruising to top spot in the provincial Junior Team Trials held July 20-21 at Southwood.

The Pine Ridge wonder was out for redemption once again as he failed to make the grade for last year's team, a disappointment he was determined not to repeat.

After the first round of team trials, McMillan was out in front with a four-round total of 284. Dean North of Carman held down second place with a total of 297. Derron Magda, still of juvenile age, was in third spot at 299.

Vying for the final team position were Tyler Rice of Wasagaming (303), Brian Houston of Niakwa (305), Jeff Lailey of Elmhurst (307), David Michaleski of Selkirk (307), Kelly Rasmussen of Rossmere (308), Mike Ciecko of Southwood (309), Todd Slatnik of Niakwa (310) and Marc Cadieux of St. Charles (311).

In final round play, McMillan continued to dominate, shooting a seven-over-par 77 to close with a five-round total of 361. Joining him on the Manitoba team headed for the Canadian Junior Championship in Ontario were Derron Magda of Elmhurst, Carman's Dean North and Brian Houston of Niakwa.

Magda recorded a final round 78 for a 377 total. Meanwhile, North shot an 82 enroute to 379 total while Houston's closing 75 gave him a total of 380.

Sixteen-year-old Houston needed to gain three shots on Wasagaming's Tyler Rice to nab the final team berth and he did so in spades. Rice's final round 89 enabled Houston to gain 14 strokes and the right to represent Manitoba.

Todd Slatnik of Niakwa enjoyed the day's best score of 73 to add to his 383 total, good enough for top spot on the provincial team for the annual Manitoba-Minnesota matches slated for the Midland Hills Golf Course in St. Paul.

Joining Slatnik in the Twin Cities were Elmhurst's Jeff Lailey, David Michaleski of Selkirk and Mike Ciecko of Southwood. It took a three-man playoff to determine the alternate player but Kevin Schledwitz of Rossmere emerged victorious after the first hole over clubmate Kelly Rasmussen and Tyler Rice.

Slatnik and Ciecko also earned spots as extra juvenile players at the national junior event in Ontario.

The Best in the West

Manitoba juvenile golfers proved they were, undoubtedly, the best in the west as our province played host to the Western Canada Juvenile Team Golf Championship July 29 and August 1 at the St.

Boniface Golf & Country Club. Rob McMillan and the home team earned individual and team honours, respectively, the second such victory for McMillan and the fourth straight team victory for Manitoba.

McMillan's opening round two-over-par 74, one up on teammate Derron Magda who missed a one-foot putt on the 18th to close with a 75. Meanwhile, Todd Slatnik and Brian Houston managed 82s to contribute to the team cause. With the top three scores counting, Manitoba finished round one at 231.

Manitoba opened up a 10-shot lead after second round play with the Alberta team nearest to the eventual champions.

Rob McMillan carded a 75 while Brian Houston shot a 78 and Derron Magda contributed an 81. Fellow teammate Todd Slatnik was a little shaky this day, racking up an 84.

In individual play, McMillan continued his dominance with a 149 total over 36 holes, seven shots better than teammate Derron Magda and Alberta's Bryce Farrell.

It was Manitoba all the way in the final round as the fearsome foursome combined their efforts for a 699 total, 13 shots better than second place Alberta. British Columbia settled for third with 724 and Saskatchewan finished with 740.

And it was McMillan all the way as the Pine Ridge golfer shot a final round one-over-par 73 for 54-hole total of 222 and the Western Canadian Juvenile individual title. Runner-up honours went to Bryce Farrell of Alberta (235).

Adding to McMillan's score were Derron Magda at 81, Brian Houston also at 81 and Todd Slatnik at 85.

Taking on Canada

The depth of Manitoba golf talent was in evidence once again as a youthful Manitoba junior team went the distance, bringing home the 1991 Canadian Junior Team Championship after a thrilling playoff at the Carleton Golf and Yacht Club in Manotick, Ontario.

Three juvenile members - Rob McMillan, Derron Magda, and Brian Houston joined forces with Dean North to capture Manitoba's first national junior/juvenile crown since 1985. Moreover, four of Manitoba's eight competitors made the cut — McMillan, Magda, Dean North and Marc Cadieux.

Always in the thick of competition, Manitoba completed the first round tied for first place with Nova Scotia. After 36 holes, Manitoba finished in a three-way tie for top spot with Nova Scotia and British Columbia, each with scores of 445. Birdies on the 18th hole by Manitobans Rob McMillan and Derron Magda propelled our provincial team into the three-team playoff.

The British Columbia team was eliminated on the first playoff hole, leaving Manitoba and Nova Scotia to battle it out for championship honours. The hero of the day was Brian Houston who birdied the second playoff hole to ensure the win for Manitoba.

Manitobans Rob McMillan, Dean North and Marc Cadieux were among the top 10 finishers at the championship, a strong indication of the wealth of golf talent existing in this province.

In individual play, Rob McMillan was looking to repeat his national juvenile championship performance of a year previous but fell just one stroke short, bowing to Ontario's Brian McCann.

Manitoba-Minnesota Matches

The 11th annual Manitoba-Minnesota matches were played August 20-21 at the Midland Hills Country Club in St. Paul, Minnesota.

Hoping for a repeat of the 1990 victory at Hecla Island, Manitoba fell behind early, bowing 5-3 in the first round of singles match play.

The second round featured teams playing four-ball match play with a victory counting as two points for each match. There again, Minnesota topped Manitoba 5-3.

Minnesota wrapped up the tournament with a cumulative total of 10 points to Manitoba's six.

McMillan's TIP

"It comes down to smart practice. A lot of people go out to the driving range and just beat balls. When I go, I make a point of really thinking about what I'm doing and making sure what I do is a repetition of what I would do if I were on the course. It's like visualization. You can build a 'muscle memory' so when you get into that situation on the course, you don't have to really think about it. It just happens.

"The one thing many amateurs have problems with is the bunker shot from beside the green. The most important thing to remember in a bunker is not to be afraid of the shot. Be aggressive and confident with it.

"With your club face pointing at the target and your stance open to the target, swing down your body line so you're swinging down from an open stance. Be sure to maintain a proper grip on the club while doing so.

"With the club face still pointing at the target during the swing, the ball comes out very soft and with lots of spin so it will land soft and won't go scooting across the green as a lot of amateurs' shots might do."

Quinton captures his first

"The tournament was at my home course so that always helps out," Quinton says with a laugh, adding the victory was "thrilling" for him. "I've played there for so long and you have to take advantage of that when it comes along."
"Seniors' golf is a lot of fun," says Quinton. "Everyone's not too serious but they enjoy it."

According to Quinton, there are about 20 or 30 golfers playing at about the same level who meet regularly through the senior putter league. As a result, the seniors' championship is a toss-up.

He laughs when reminded he is Manitoba's reigning senior champ and salutes another who was truly in a class by himself.

"Jimmy Doyle was a step above the rest as the result showed when he went to the Canadians," says Quinton of the popular former champion who passed away in 1991. The 42-year member of Niakwa savoured his first tournament win after a playoff was necessary to break a deadlock between himself and Carl Teplitski of Pine Ridge.

The two were tied at 233 after 54 holes; one shot better than Niakwa's Ron Castelane and two up on Pine Ridge's Bruce Hudson. The four

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For Gord Lenton, it's a great game in more ways than one

PUT SELKIRK'S GORD LENTON ANYWHERE NEAR THE GAME OF GOLF AND, AS A RULE, HE'S A HAPPY MAN.

It was that attitude which inspired Lenton to pursue volunteer opportunities with the MGA, a move it seems he's never regretted.

"I guess I wanted to put something back into the game, as everyone says," laughs Lenton of his motivation to work with the MGA. "It sounds like a cliché, but it's true. I've played golf in every province in Canada, courtesy of the Manitoba Golf Association. It's been just great so it seemed like a good way to repay them and I enjoy it, too. Anything that has to do with golf — being around the golf course and golfers — there's nothing better."

Lenton's area of expertise is officiating, just recently having been certified as a golf referee. He speaks of his volunteer endeavours with sincere enthusiasm: "Golf rules have always interested me. It's a game where, in order to really enjoy it, you have to play by the rules. They are there to help you rather than hinder you."

Lenton takes his work seriously but especially enjoys the educational facet of officiating. He says he loves to work with junior players who may violate rules through inexperience.

"They are so 'green' that when you do tell them a rule, almost without fail, they say 'thank you'," says Lenton, noting he prefers to educate than penalize with this age group. "I think, in all my years as a referee, I only had to penalize a kid once, for having too many clubs."

Lenton believes his 'educate rather than penalize' philosophy helps young golfers remember the rules better.

"You don't want to turn kids off," he says. "You could penalize them for something they are completely ignorant of.

I'd say 99% of the time, the rule infractions are very innocent."

Lenton's volunteer assignments enable him to spend time at the golf course with golf people and that's where he likes to be. With memberships at both the Selkirk and Pine Ridge golf courses, his retirement lifestyle is anything but sedate. His own prowess on the course has not faltered over time and he continues to be a solid contender among Manitoba senior golfers.

Lenton captured low amateur honours in both the 1965 and 1966 Manitoba Open championships as well as the 1971 Quebec Open. He was a member of Manitoba's Willingdon Cup team in 1967 and represented Quebec in the 1970 version of that tournament.

Lenton won the Manitoba Senior crown in his first year of eligibility (1982) then repeated the feat in 1987. He earned a spot on the provincial senior team seven times in nine years and earned runner-up honours at the Canadian Senior Championship in 1986. Lenton also laid claim to eight club championships at Selkirk between 1953 and 1987 and another at Pine Ridge in 1973.

"Accuracy is the key," he says of his golf success. "Staying out of trouble and

having a good putting round helps but accuracy is the main thing."

Senior golf suits Lenton just fine. The camaraderie among players and keen competition without the pressure associated with golf in younger age groups seems an ideal situation for the avid senior enthusiast. And he has no plans to ever give up the game he so obviously enjoys.

"I'll play till I drop," laughs Lenton, adding he hopes to stay involved with the MGA. "Right now, I'm in charge of officials. I do enjoy being involved with golf — it's a great game."

Genoway's TIP

"If I had a tip that's worked for me, it's try to play within your means. Try to play to as high a percentage as you can. If you aren't hitting a club well, try to avoid that club during your game. Don't have high expectations for parts of your game that aren't working very well. In all likelihood, you'll get yourself in trouble.

"I think playing within your means and using what works for you is important. If you have good 3- and 4-wood games, there's no reason to use your driver on a golf course like Hecla where any little mistake ends up costing you a couple of strokes. Courses like Hecla can be intimidating and you may have a tendency to play shots that you aren't necessarily capable of making."

Ridley's TIP

The 1991 rural Amateur Champion's advice for playing better golf is simple: "Visit a pro. That's what I do."

Genoway repeats while Ridley and Michaleski enjoy first titles

FORMER CHAMP BOB GENOWAY DID IT AGAIN, CAPTURING THE MANITOBA RURAL AMATEUR GOLF CROWN AFTER 36 HOLES OF PLAY AT HECLA.

MANITOBA RURAL AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP

Bob Genoway, of Morden (Minnewasta), fired a first round three-under-par 69 for a two-stroke lead going into final round play.

Two strokes back of the leader was Brad Clement of Russell at one-under-71. Barry Tanasichuk of Gilbert Plains was another shot back with a first round par-72.

Five shots off the pace and tied at 74 were Glen Morrison of Pinawa, Dwight Kearns of Brandon Wheat City, Ken Grove and Tim Cromarty of Selkirk and former rural amateur champ Bruce North of Carman.

Genoway added a second round 74 to his opening 69 for a one-under-par 143 and the championship.

"I think I played solidly from tee to green. I was putting well and staying out of trouble," says Genoway

who attributed the victory to the assistance of his 14-year-old nephew/caddy, Julian Fisher.

"Julian was really helpful and I feel like we won it together," said Genoway. "He was my good luck charm."

Five shots off the pace was Barry Tanasichuk of Gilbert Plains at 148 while former champ Bruce North claimed third place with a two-round total of 148. Arnie Biluk of Sandy Hook finished fourth at 151 while Keith Fawcett and Tim Cromarty of Selkirk tied for fifth at 152.

"As a former champion, I usually feel I can be competitive if I'm playing well and I felt I was playing so well my expectations were high," says Genoway of his thoughts going into the tournament. "Hecla Island, to me, is a really tough golf course and it seems if you can play the course conservatively and make as few mistakes as possible, you can bet the other golfers will probably get themselves in trouble."

Mel Bituk of Sandy Hook and Phil Hall of Brandon finished atop the first flight at 153. David Keating of Russell (158) won the second flight, followed by Michael Funke of Carman. In the third, Pinawa's Bill Boivin led with 163, one shot ahead of Max MacLeod of Brandon. Cliff Sveinson of Northernnaire won the fourth flight with a 163, two shots better than Albert Klassen of Winkler.

MANITOBA

RURAL SENIOR CHAMPIONSHIP

The 1991 Manitoba Rural Senior Championship was claimed by Weldon Ridley of Morden whose 36-hole total of 76-80=156 was one better than Roy Minish of Swan River 74-83=157.

Ridley was also the best golfer in his age division (55-64) over the tournament, six strokes better than Glen Sinclair of Kingswood (82-81=163) and 10 ahead of Murray Sim of Selkirk (86-80=166).

"I just went to play in a tournament and things turned out rather well for me," says Ridley, downplaying his success, with a laugh. "I enjoyed the tournament and the fellows I played with. We all had a good time that day and I just happened to be the lucky one."

In the 65 and over age group, tournament runner-up Roy Minish of Swan River was tops with 74-83=157. Two strokes back was Barrie Sanders of Carman at 79-80=159, followed by Joe Nespor of Pinawa with 80-85=165.

MANITOBA RURAL JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP

The Manitoba Rural Junior Championship was claimed by Selkirk's David Michaleski but the champ might have missed out had it not been for some friendly advice.

"At first, I didn't want to enter because it was a little far away from Selkirk," says Michaleski of the tournament held at the Minnewasta Golf Club in Morden. "But my friend, Mark Anderson (assistant pro at Selkirk) kind of prodded me along and gave me the incentive to go."

It was a good thing, as Michaleski's five-over-par 77 topped the field of 72 competitors to give him the win.

"After the first nine holes, I settled down a little bit," Michaleski recalls. "I didn't play that well on the front nine (41) but on the back nine, I shot even par."

Runner-up honours were shared by Brandon's Jody Chudley and Andy Oakden, each with a 78. Carman's Dean North tied Brandon's Bill Dinsdale at 79 while Brad Houghton of Pine Falls shot an 80 to finish in sixth place.

"I'd never seen the course before so I just wanted to play well," says Michaleski about his tournament expectations. "I'd played with a lot of those guys and I thought I could compete with them. If I played well, I would do O.K. I never really thought about winning it. I just wanted to play well."

Age group winners were (12 and under) Jonathon Martin of Minnedosa with runner-up Scott Kulchycki of Dauphin; (13-14) Robert Maki of Brandon Wheat City with runner-up David Frost of Kenora; (15-16) Brad Houghton of Pine Falls with runner-up Derek Gross of Brandon Wheat City; (17-18) David Michaleski of Selkirk with runner-up Jody Chudley of Brandon Wheat City.

Michaleski's TIP

"One thing that's really helped me is I spend a lot more time on my short game now. I'd recommend anyone spending a lot of time on that because it's a big part of your game. I took lessons with Pat Kemball at Kingswood Golf Dome as part of the MGA program and he pointed out that almost 50% of your game is putting. If I could tell everybody one thing, it would be 'spend more time on a putting green.' There's only about three clubs you can really practice — your driver, middle and short irons and your putter. If you can hit a seven-iron, driver and putter, you should be O.K."

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Genoway makes his mark

The Vice-President of MGA's Rural Operations, Genoway first became interested in golf as a youth when his parents operated a small nine-hole golf course near their Swan River farm. Summers spent at the course helped develop his appreciation for the game and a skill level that would serve him well in his adult years.

"I got involved in the MGA after I moved to Morden in 1983," recalls Genoway, a regional recreation manager for the provincial government. "I was playing golf at a competitive level so I was involved in a lot of MGA events. I always felt strongly that there should be a strong rural voice in the MGA; strongly enough that I ended up getting involved."

In his position on the MGA Board of Directors, Genoway is responsible for representing the interests of the large proportion of clubs located outside of Winnipeg.

Because he can't be in all places at all times, Genoway receives input from approximately 15 MGA councillors in the region to ensure the best interests of all rural clubs are sufficiently served.

"I could see my term as rural chairman lasting anywhere from another year to three years and then the natural progression after that would be into the presidency," says Genoway. "I like our Board of Directors' attitude that we're trying new things and we're listening to our members; trying to implement new ideas and not just maintaining the status quo."

One of those "new ideas" is the very popular bi-annual Golf Forum which brings together members of the Manitoba golf community in an exchange of information and ideas related to the development of better golf games and better golf courses. The Forum, the first of its kind in Canada, features golf experts from across

the continent. Genoway who has chaired both the 1990 and 1992 editions, believes the 'celebrities' play a large role in the conference's success.

"People in Manitoba want to develop their golf course and their golf game. They're probably no different than golf enthusiasts anywhere in the world," says Genoway. "So, when there's a chance to talk to people who are considered 'experts', people like to do that. Our role was not only to get those people to come to Manitoba but to do so at an affordable rate so that anyone interested in golf could come to it. I think we've succeeded with that."

The Forum also provides members of the Manitoba Ladies Golf Association with the opportunity to formally exchange ideas with their male counterparts, a move Genoway applauds.

"The two groups have been somewhat separate all these years, like they are in curling," Genoway says. "I think we're slowly breaking that barrier in Manitoba and it's about time, as far as I'm concerned."

Genoway says the most satisfying part of his MGA involvement is the opportunity to see some of his work in action, whether the results are tangible or intangible.

"One of the most rewarding parts of my MGA work is knowing some of the ideas I brought to the table are benefitting the people who golf and develop golf in Manitoba," explains Genoway. "Take the Golf Forum, as an example; tying that to the concept of seeing it grow and help people is very satisfying.

Being able to subsidize and promote a clinic in rural Manitoba and then two or three years down the road, seeing some youngster developing in his game — just maybe that clinic or some sort of help we provided played some small role in that."

Genoway has also had some rather satisfying moments on the links, winning the rural amateur crown in 1986, 1988 and 1991. This past year, he was a member of Manitoba's North America Cup team and he hopes one day to make the Willingdon Cup team.

Also included in Genoway's future plans is a continued involvement with the Manitoba Golf Association's Board of Directors and further evidence of his dedication to the development of Manitoba golf.

"I think we've made progress in the last five years and I still think we can go a lot farther," Genoway says of the MGA Board. "I'd still like to be involved there and I'm still very interested at the local level as I chair the junior program in Morden. And, as a competitor, I still want to compete for a while. That's the beauty of golf; you can keep on playing."

I was about 4 or 5 up after 9 holes and the match ended on the 12th."

Naturally, Lavallee was pleased with the result.

"In other years, I lost in the finals and I didn't play very well. If you play well and you lose, then you really can't be too disappointed. This time was different."

Lavallee's
TIP

"In match play, I really think that familiarity with the course you're playing is a big advantage. Being older (laughs), I've played most of the courses and often. In qualifying, especially on this one course we play — Wildewood — it's a short nine-hole course and very narrow. The priority is keeping the ball in play. If you hit it amongst the big trees, it could be bouncing around there for a long time and a lot of people find it very frustrating to play. I think I used my driver twice in the whole round. I just used my iron off the tee. It's a short course so you really don't need a driver. A lot of people feel that if you've got the thing (driver) in your bag, you have to use it. Familiarity is very important, so go out and play the course before the match."

The golf course boom

THOUGH THE GOLF SEASON IS BUT SIX MONTHS LONG IN THIS PROVINCE, MANITOBANS ARE GOLF CRAZY. WHETHER PLAYED FOR FUN, RELAXATION, COMPETITION, TO STRENGTHEN BUSINESS TIES OR CREATE NEW ONES, AN INCREASING NUMBER OF PEOPLE ARE ENJOYING THE GAME OF GOLF, AS EVIDENCED BY THE EVER-INCREASING NUMBER OF NEW GOLF FACILITIES.

In the '90s alone, 10 new courses have opened and another eight have been expanded to 18 holes. Despite the growing number of facilities, courses continue to be popular places in warm weather even when clouds of mosquitoes are counted among the course's natural hazards.

Golf courses unveiling new or expanded facilities in recent years include:

• LORETTE GOLF COURSE

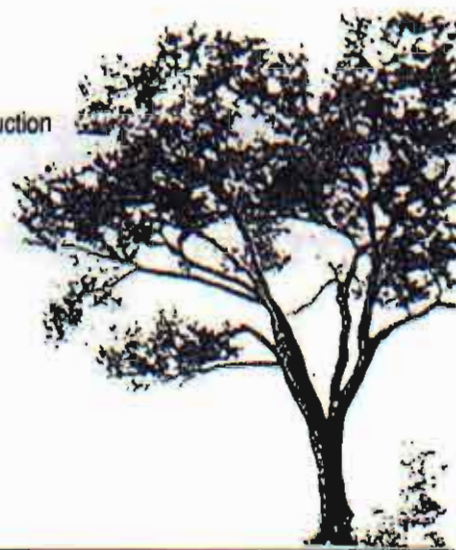

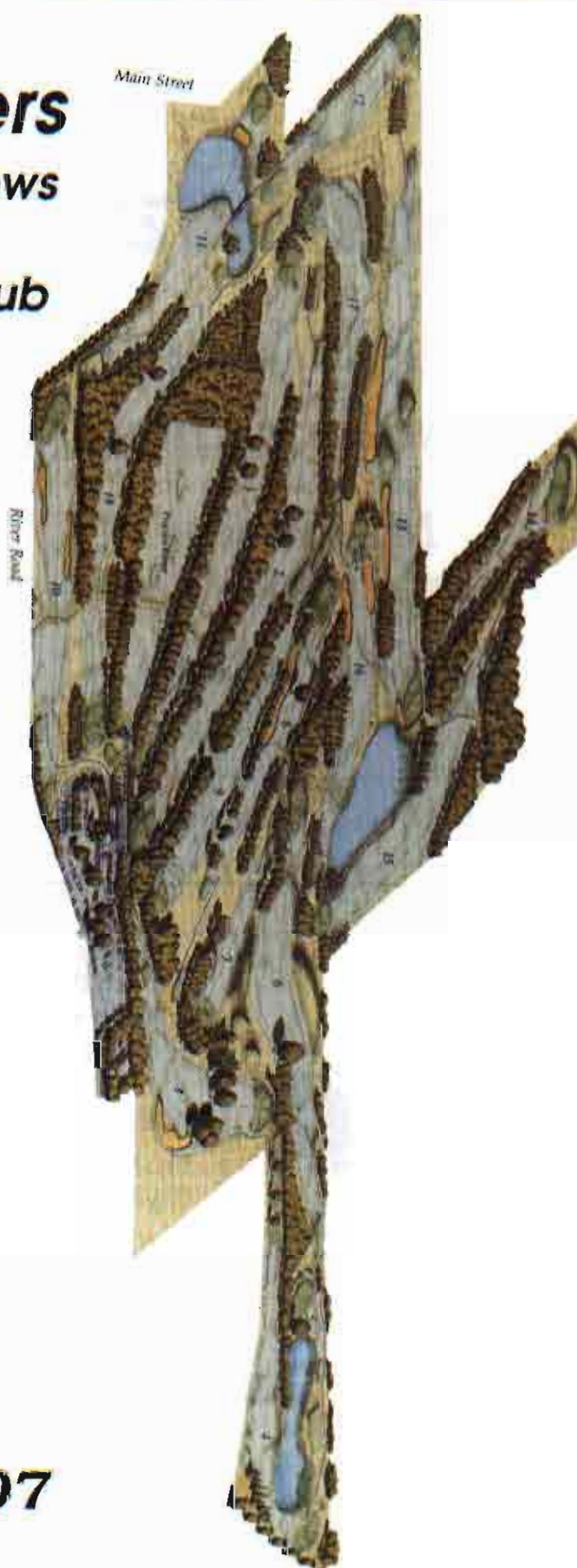

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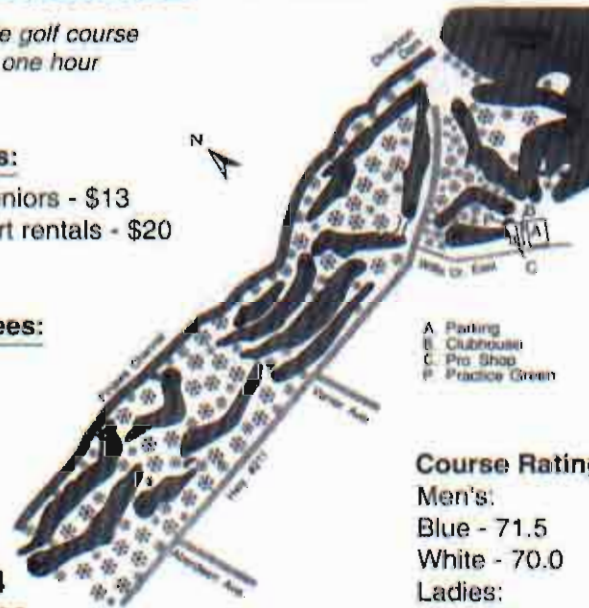
